Section I - INTRODUCTION

PURPOSE OF THE INSPECTION

A U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) reconnaissance Sanitary Sewer System Compliance Inspection, in conjunction with PG Environmental, LLC, a USEPA contractor, was performed at the City of Rockwall, Texas on March 5, 2015. The inspection was conducted in the guidance established by the USEPA under the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES). The purpose of this targeted site visit was to evaluate the City of Rockwall's operations and maintenance of their collection system and their reporting procedures as implemented under the Texas Water Code (TWC), Texas Administrative Code (TAC), the Clean Water Act (CWA), and the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR). An entry briefing was conducted by EPA inspector James Zimny, an the inspector met with various City of Rockwall personnel including Timothy Tumulty - Director of Public Works, Rich Sherer -Water/Wastewater Manager, Jerry Strouse - Field Operations Supervisor, and Steve Clawson - Field Operations Manager.

BACKGROUND

The City of Rockwall's collection system services approximately 40,000 residents. The collection system is primarily operated and maintained by the Water and Wastewater Division and the Production Tech Division of the City's Public Works Department. The City is divided into two main sewer drainage basins. All City sewage eventually flows into the NTMWD interceptor system and to one of the three NTMWD-owned and operated WWTP's, two of which, the Squabble Creek and Buffalo Creek WWTP's, are located in the City limits. The third WWTP is the South Mesquite Creek Regional WWTP, located in Mesquite.

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I. INTRODUCTION

On March 5, 2015, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), with assistance from PG Environmental, LLC, an EPA contractor (collectively the EPA Inspection Team), evaluated the City of Rockwall's (City's) compliance as it relates to the operation and maintenance of the City's collection system, as well as reporting procedures. The compliance inspection consisted of the following:

- Discussions with representatives from the City regarding the operation and maintenance (O&M) of the collection system, reporting procedures, the collection system plans and manuals, and the capital improvement program (CIP).
- Examination of the City's collection system operation, maintenance, and reporting records.
- Review of the City's data warehousing systems and collection of datasets and documents relevant to the inspection.

The City's wastewater collection system is regulated under the *Texas Water Code* (TWC), *Texas Administrative Code* (TAC), the *Texas Health and Safety Code*, the *Clean Water Act* (CWA), and the *Code of Federal Regulations* (CFR). Flows from the City are discharged to the North Texas Municipal Water District (NTMWD) interceptor system, and eventually to the Buffalo Creek Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP), the Squabble Creek WWTP, or the South Mesquite Creek Regional WWTP. The Buffalo Creek WWTP is regulated under National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permit No. TX0078565, Squabble Creek WWTP is regulated under NPDES Permit No. TX0022241, and the South Mesquite Creek Regional WWTP is regulated under NPDES Permit No. TX0047431.

II. OVERVIEW OF WASTEWATER SYSTEM

The information presented below is based on documents and presentations provided by the City. The EPA Inspection Team was unable to conduct outdoor field activities due to inclement weather (i.e., an ice and snow storm) encountered on the day of the inspection. The weather conditions created traffic and general safety hazards due to the ice and snow on roads and City assets.

A. Wastewater System Background

The City's service area is approximately 29.8 square miles; the collection system services approximately 40,000 residents. The collection system is primarily operated and maintained by the Water and Wastewater Division and the Production Tech Division of the City's Public Works Department. The collection system is composed of approximately 234 miles of sewer pipe, which includes 6.4 miles of sewer in the recently acquired Lake Rockwall Estates development (previously serviced by Aqua–Texas). Approximately 24 miles of the collection system is force mains, and the rest is gravity. Approximately 11 miles of the sewer pipes are vitrified clay and the majority of the rest (approximately 93 percent) are polyvinyl chloride (PVC). More than 50 percent of the sewer lines in the City were installed after the year 2000. The City operates and maintains 39 lift stations; all are linked to the City's supervisory control and data acquisition (SCADA) system. One NTMWD lift station (i.e., the Turtle Cove Lift Station) and eight privately owned and operated lift stations are located within the City's limits and discharge into the City's collection system.

The City is divided into two main sewer drainage basins. All City sewage eventually flows into the NTMWD interceptor system and to one of three NTMWD-owned and operated WWTPs, two of which, the Squabble Creek and Buffalo Creek WWTPs, are located in the City limits. The third WWTP is the South Mesquite Creek Regional WWTP, located in Mesquite. The City has seven separate agreements with NTMWD for the conveyance and treatment of wastewater. The City also has an agreement with the City of McLendon-Chisholm to allow flow from McLendon-Chisholm to pass through the City's system to the NTMWD interceptor system, and eventually to the South Mesquite Regional WWTP. Flow entering the NTMWD interceptor system is monitored by NTMWD at several locations near the City's connections. Refer to Exhibit 1 for maps of the City's drainage basins, sewer lines, and NTMWD connections and interceptors.

City representatives stated that the City had not developed a flow/capacity model for the collection systems; they added the City was close to initiating a flow study at the time of the inspection. They stated that the City Council had approved \$300,000 in funding on March 2, 2015 for a flow monitoring study. The study will help the City to develop a calibrated system model to identify areas where sewer capacity may be an issue due to increased flow volume attributed to development and/or inflow and infiltration. At the time of the inspection, the City was using an estimated model based on another city with similar size/characteristics.

B. Collection System Mapping and Work Order System

The City had a geographic information system-based (GIS-based) map, which depicted assets such as sewer lines, manholes, and lift stations. The GIS included information on asset age, material (in the case of pipes and manholes), size, and related equipment (e.g., number and types of pumps installed at a lift station). The GIS also included the location of NTMWD interceptors, connections, and the Turtle Cove Lift Station.

The City was utilizing an electronic work order system at the time of the inspection. The work order system primarily tracked assets by address, not by asset identification number. Further, the City's work order system was primarily used for tracking employee time and specific materials needed to complete a task rather than the unique work history for a specific asset. City representatives stated that they populate some information in the system, including the category label for each issue, using drop-down menus to promote consistency. The drop-down menus included numerous labels, including one for "preventive maintenance." Relevant details concerning the City's work order system are discussed where applicable throughout this report.

C. <u>Receiving and Responding to Service Requests</u>

The EPA Inspection Team reviewed the City's system for receiving and responding to customer service requests. During business hours (i.e., 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday) the City receives calls at its service center on Airport Road. After normal business hours, calls come in to the police department and are forwarded to on-call personnel. There is always one employee on call to cover any emergency calls for the Water and Wastewater Division, as well as one staff member from the Production Tech Division. The on-call staff members are responsible for generating work orders related to after-hours calls.

A possible wastewater overflow called in by a customer or an overflow detected by the City's personnel is supposed to be reported immediately to the wastewater field supervisor and the production tech field supervisor. The Production Tech Division is mobilized for any pump failures, power outages, or high-level alarms through the City's SCADA system. Operators are notified by pagers of any possible problem. If the initial page is not answered, the SCADA system continues to page other production tech employees until the alarm is addressed. The wastewater team is dispatched to mitigate overflows.

The City provided the EPA Inspection Team with its *Sanitary Sewer Overflow Response Plan* (SSORP), which was dated March 2015 (refer to Exhibit 2). The City had not implemented the document or provided SSORP training to personnel as of the date of the inspection.

D. Collection System Maintenance

City representatives stated that the City had one jet truck, one trailer-mounted jetting unit, and one 1,000gallon trailer-mounted vacuum unit (used for sewer work and hydroexcavation). City representatives stated that operators typically jet lines during routine cleaning and use the vacuum unit only as needed. The City does not own a closed circuit television (CCTV) truck, but does have a push camera for televising laterals when needed. The City does not have a routine CCTV program. The collection system is televised by a contractor as needed.

City representatives stated that the City has a "hot spot" cleaning program, with approximately 11 locations receiving weekly flushing and 4 locations receiving monthly flushing. A review of the data provided by the City at the time of the inspection indicated that the City had added some locations and had removed others from the program between 2012 and the date of the inspection. City representatives stated that most hot spots are areas where the line is flat or settled, causing grease and debris to accumulate. They added that if operators are not conducting hot spot cleaning, they are responding to

customer calls. The City did not have a maintenance program in place with the goal of cleaning or televising the entire collection system. City representatives stated that they hope to move to a preventive program in the near future.

Collection system operation and maintenance is described in more detail in section III, Finding 1 of this report.

E. <u>Lift Stations</u>

At the time of the inspection, the City had 39 lift stations. All lift stations were linked to the City's SCADA system for wet-well monitoring and pump-runtime trending. The SCADA system polls the lift stations every seven minutes. It alerts operators of alarms, but does not allow for remote adjustment of operations. All of the operational control activities needed to be done onsite. Notification of alarms at the lift stations were sent to operators' pagers or cellular phones. City representatives stated that 35 lift stations had redundant pumping capacity, and the remaining 4 only had one pump each. They stated that the City had two small backup pumps that could be installed during an emergency. City representatives stated that most of the lift stations are can-style stations, which require confined space entry permits for entry.

City representatives stated that two teams of two operators each conducted 3–4 general lift station inspections per day per team. The City did not have a formal preventive maintenance process for lift stations or standard operating procedures (SOPs) for lift station-related O&M tasks. City representatives stated that operators looked for grease accumulation during inspections and cleaned the wet wells as needed. Most lift station maintenance was reactive. The City did not have onsite backup power capability for 30 of the 39 lift stations. The City does have two trailer generators rated at 200 kilowatts each to cover outages for the 30 lift stations without onsite backup power. City representatives stated that they had estimated the detention time for some wet wells in order to determine how much response time they had in an emergency, but they had not performed these calculations for all lift stations. Lift station maintenance and backup power is described in more detail in section III, Finding 1 of this report.

City representatives stated that the City-owned Squabble Creek Lift Station is used to divert high flows from the Squabble Creek WWTP into the NTMWD-owned Rockwall/Heath Regional Trunk Sewer, which conveys flow to the South Mesquite Regional WWTP. City representatives stated that NTMWD operators have access to the lift station and are the ones who manually activate the diversion mechanism based on flows to the NTMWD-owned Squabble Creek WWTP. The Squabble Creek WWTP has an average daily flow of 1 million gallons per day (mgd), with peaks of up to 4 mgd. The lift station can pump approximately 7 mgd into the trunk sewer. Literature provided by the City (refer to Exhibit 3) indicates that peak wet-weather flows to the WWTP may reach 14 mgd when the service area is fully developed. Further, the City is planning construction of a second lift station in the area, as the Squabble Creek WWTP may be decommissioned in the future. The status of the project was unclear at the time of the inspection.

III. ASSESSMENT OF COMPLIANCE

Based on discussions conducted during the inspection, and a review of documents and data collected during the inspection, the EPA Inspection Team noted the following findings of potential noncompliance:

Finding 1. Failure to implement proper O&M of the collection system

Specifically, Title 30 of TAC § 291.94(C)(1) states:

The retail public utility shall maintain its collection system and appurtenances to minimize blockages.

Title 30 of the TAC § 305.125(5) states:

The permittee shall at all times properly operate and maintain all facilities and systems of treatment and control (and related appurtenances) installed or used by the permittee to achieve compliance with the permit conditions. For Underground Injection Control permits proper operation and maintenance includes effective performance, adequate funding, adequate operator staffing and training, and adequate laboratory and process controls, including appropriate quality assurance procedures. This provision requires the operation of back-up or auxiliary facilities or similar systems only when necessary to achieve compliance with the permit conditions.

Similar language is also included in 40 CFR § 122.41(e).

At the time of the inspection, the City's collection system O&M activities were not structured or managed to minimize blockages. Efforts needed to minimize blockages (partial or total) include a regular review of maintenance activities and management practices. For this to occur, management systems must be employed and must be properly populated with maintenance activities and findings. Regular reviews allow personnel to determine proactive cleaning and maintenance frequencies. This structured approach needs to be applied to the decision-making process for determining which assets should be rehabilitated or replaced. The City did not have a formalized maintenance approach to ensure the entire collection system was operating properly. City representatives stated that the City performs high frequency (i.e., hot spot) cleaning in certain areas; however, the City does not have a set cycle for cleaning or televising the entire sewer system. City representatives stated that when operators are not performing hot spot cleaning, they are responding to customer complaints. City representatives stated that a contractor conducts CCTV inspections as the City needs them.

Proper operation and maintenance of a collection system also relies, in part, on maintaining accurate, upto-date information in an accessible format. This information includes collection system data, field documentation, and task-specific written SOPs to ensure that maintenance activities are properly conducted, verified, and populated into the City's information custodian system. Field observations are critical to the proper operation and maintenance of the collection system and should document the uniqueness of the field activity performed. This includes recording detailed and complete observations, such as how much and what type of debris was removed from a sewer segment or wet well during cleaning, and the specific observed condition of an asset at the time of inspection or maintenance activities.

The City had an electronic work order system, but it was mainly used to track employee hours and cost of materials for work completed in order to support budget and financial needs, not for facilitating a preventive maintenance approach. The City was not tracking the total linear footage of sewer cleaned or inspected, making it impossible to determine how much of the system had been cleaned. City representatives stated that operators may report the presence of grease and debris observed while performing maintenance and repairs; however, the City did not quantify or classify the amount of debris encountered during sewer cleaning in order to benchmark normal conditions and to identify potential problems upstream. The City did not have an SOP for sewer cleaning.

Keeping detailed datasets in a centralized database (the custodian of O&M records) enables operators to refine maintenance frequencies and to better employ predictive maintenance strategies, not just preventive strategies. The proper application of an O&M plan requires evaluating pertinent, validated field documentation so that maintenance activities can be budgeted and scheduled s to ensure proper operation of assets and prevent sewer backup issues. The documentation process also supports proper planning, budgeting, and scheduling for CIP projects.

The City had 39 lift stations at the time of the inspection. City representatives stated that a formal preventive maintenance schedule had not been established for critical components of the City's lift stations. Further, they stated that the only routine maintenance performed at City lift stations was monthly wet well inspections for grease; if the inspection results indicated a need the wet wells were cleaned.

Thirty of the City's 39 lift stations did not have onsite backup power, and the City only had two portable 200-kilowatt generators. City representatives stated that the lift stations without onsite backup power did not have quick-connect sockets for the portable generators, and the portable generators would need to be hard-wired into the stations' breaker panels. Texas wastewater system design requirements included in Chapter 217 of the TAC require lift stations without onsite backup power to be equipped with a tested quick-connect mechanism or a transfer switch properly sized to connect to a portable generator. Further, the retention capacity in a lift station's wet well and incoming gravity pipes must prevent discharges of untreated wastewater at the lift station or any point upstream for a period of time equal to the longest electrical outage recorded during the past 24 months, but not less than 20 minutes. Failure to pump a lift station's wet well at the proper frequency can lead to overflows.

City representatives stated that they had recently estimated the detention times (i.e., time a station could go without pumping before overflowing the wet well or points upstream) for 18 of the City's lift station wet wells. Holding times for some stations without onsite backup power were estimated as low as 20 minutes, meaning it would be difficult for two portable generators to be effectively used at multiple stations during widespread simultaneous outages/failures. The City should determine detention times for the other 21 lift stations. A list of City lift stations along with detention time information is included in <u>Exhibit 4</u>. City representatives stated that all stations are connected to a SCADA system for monitoring levels and alarms. They stated that all lift stations have a 30-minute backup battery for the SCADA system telemetry. After a 30-minute power failure, 30 of the 39 lift stations would have to be manually checked for operational variables (e.g., wet well level).

The City provided a list of work orders generated between April 5, 2010 and July 22, 2014 (refer to Exhibit 5). The list contained 166 work order references categorized as "pump failure" and 148 labeled as "power loss." The work order entries had been sorted in such a way that the issue category did not match the correct date, location, and problem description. This made it impossible for the EPA Inspection Team to determine the exact nature and date of each event or the impacts of the events on the environment or human health.

Finding 2. Failure to prevent unauthorized/unpermitted discharges

Specifically, TWC section 26.121(a) states:

Except as authorized by the commission, no person may:

- (1) discharge sewage, municipal waste, recreational waste, agricultural waste, or industrial waste into or adjacent to any water in the state;
- (2) discharge other waste into or adjacent to any water in the state which in itself or in conjunction with any other discharge or activity causes, continues to cause, or will cause pollution of any of the water in the state.

In addition, section 301 of the CWA states:

a. Except as in compliance with this section and sections 302, 306, 307, 318, 402, and 404 of this Act, the discharge of any pollutant by any person shall be unlawful.

Further, 40 CFR section 122.1(b) states:

(1) The NPDES program requires permits for the discharge of "pollutants" from any "point source" into "waters of the United States."

It should be noted that TWC section 26.039(b) states:

Whenever an accidental discharge or spill occurs at or from any activity or facility which causes or may cause pollution, the individual operating, in charge of, or responsible for the activity or facility shall notify the commission as soon as possible and not later than 24 hours after the occurrence. The individual's notice to the commission must include the location, volume, and content of the discharge or spill.

The City provided the EPA Inspection Team with records of 19 SSO events reported to the Texas Commission of Environmental Quality (TCEQ) between 2011 and the date of the inspection (refer to Exhibit 6) as well as a map showing the locations of those SSOs (refer to Exhibit 7). SSOs were reported to have been caused by such issues as pump failure, grease/debris, and construction material in the sewer. At least 4 events in the 19 reports were caused by failures at the Turtle Cove Lift Station, which is owned and operated by NTMWD. All four events happened in 2012. Three separate SSOs were reported for March 20, 2012, and one was reported for January 26, 2012. In each case, the pumps at the station clogged during a heavy rain event, causing sewage to spill out of a manhole and ultimately end up in Lake Ray Hubbard. It was unclear whether NTMWD also reported these events to TCEQ or if any other SSO events linked to the Turtle Cove Lift Station, had occurred and been reported by NTMWD (i.e., events that may not have shown up in City records). In addition to the issues linked to the Turtle Cove Lift Station, the City also reported six SSOs linked to failures and grease buildup at City-owned and operated lift stations. For example, an SSO was reported at 501 Quail Run Road (the address of the Quail Run Lift Station) on May 9, 2012 as a result of a "lift station getting caught on grease causing manhole to overflow." It was unclear if cleaning had ever been conducted in the area.

The City provided a list of all work orders generated between April 5, 2010 and July 22, 2014 (refer to <u>Exhibit 5</u>). The list contained 24 work order references labeled "manhole overflow." The entries had been sorted in such a way that the issue category did not match the correct date, location, and problem description. This made it impossible for the EPA Inspection Team to determine the nature of each overflow event, and if any of the entries corresponded to the 19 SSOs (mentioned above) that had been reported to TCEQ.

The City does not report private sewer backups to TCEQ; however, a sewage release occurring on private property that is caused by an issue or failure in the City-owned portion of the collection system is an SSO. The City provided a map of "sewer stop" work orders issued between 2010 and 2014 (refer to Exhibit 8). The map indicated numerous sewer stoppages had occurred in the time period; however, the dataset did not indicate any details other than location. The EPA Inspection Team could not determine which entity, the City or the property owner, was responsible for any of the events. The EPA Inspection Team also could not determine the exact number of events represented on the map, based on the information provided.

After the inspection, the City provided a list of sewer-related work orders for 2012 and 2013 (refer to <u>Exhibit 9</u>). The dataset indicated 144 work orders labeled as "sewer stop" and 11 work orders labeled as "sewer manhole overflow" in 2012. The 2013 data indicated 249 "sewer stop" and 4 "sewer manhole overflow" work orders. All of the 2012 SSOs reported to TCEQ (see above) appeared to be categorized as either sewer stops or manhole overflows; however, neither of the 2013 events appeared to be included in the dataset provided. Further, the dataset indicated numerous other occurrences of either backups or overflows in the collection system or sewage releases to private property. In some cases, the provided data made it clear which entity, the City or a private property owner, was at fault; however, many times there was too little detail to diagnose the exact nature of the event, who was responsible for the

overflow/backup (i.e., public or private), or the extent of the release of raw sewage. Refer to section IV.A for additional details about the City's SSO reporting and documentation.

City representatives stated that when operators respond to calls for homeowner backups, they typically jet the lateral from the customer's cleanout and calculate the approximate distance of the blockage from the house/property based on the length of hose used. City representatives stated that some properties have a cleanout at the property line, making it easier to determine who has responsibility for the backup (the City or the private owner). They stated that if the City side of the cleanout was clear, the City most likely would not jet the lateral.

As mentioned previously, the City had an SSORP, which was dated in March 2015 (refer to Exhibit 2); however, the SSORP had not been implemented and personnel had not been trained on it as of the date of the inspection.

IV. ADDITIONAL CONCERNS

In addition to the findings described above, the EPA Inspection Team also identified one area of concern based on conversations with City staff and observations made during document review and field activities.

A. SSO Reporting and Documentation

As stated in Finding 2, Failure to prevent unauthorized/unpermitted discharges, the EPA Inspection Team was unable to verify whether or not some callout records and work orders indicated the occurrence of SSOs. The City's field and documentation practices made it difficult or impossible to determine whether and overflow occurred, root cause(s), immediate corrective actions, modifications of maintenance approaches and frequencies, and if proper reporting had taken place for SSOs when applicable.

The City provided a list of sewer-related work orders for 2012 and 2013 (refer to Exhibit 9). The dataset indicated a total of 393 work orders labeled as "sewer stop" and 15 work orders labeled as "sewer manhole overflow." In most cases, it was difficult to determine the exact nature of the event included in each entry (e.g., cause, responsibility, and corrective action); however, there were several entries that indicated an SSO had occurred as a result of an issue/failure in a City-owned asset. Further, the data seemed to indicate there were multiple occasions where SSOs had occurred and not been reported to TCEQ. The list below describes four examples from the City-provided data where an SSO appeared to have occurred, but was not reported to TCEQ (Note: There may be other instances not identified as of the date of this report):

- 1. June 25, 2013 at 1954 Signal Ridge Place The main was stopped up with grease and sewage was coming out of the cleanout. The City cleared the blockage.
- 2. April 6, 2013 at Pompeii Court and Mediterranean Drive –Manhole was overflowing. Tried to unblock it with the big hose and got the hose stuck, then got the little hose stuck. Got everything unstuck and then unblocked the sewer line. Had to use the Vac Trailer.
- 3. December 3, 2012 at Rusk Street and Ross Main line was stopped up. The driveway off of Clark on Rusk going into Dobbs Elementary was overflowing. The City unstopped the line and called in to report the work was completed.
- 4. May 24, 2012 at East IH 30 The manhole in front of Joe Willies had grease in the main line. That made the four manholes up stream to back up and the manhole at Rockwall Dodge was overflowing. Did clean up when finished.

V. RECOMMENDED REFERENCE MATERIALS

The EPA Inspection Team emphasizes the need for a more structured preventive sewer maintenance and cleaning program. The City's preventive sewer maintenance and cleaning program should be supported by field observations and documentation. Observations and documentation should be reviewed with appropriate satellite communities so coordinated activities and resources can be maximized. The EPA Inspection Team recommends the City develop and implement structured, written SOPs for any sewer maintenance and cleaning performed by the City and its contractors.

The SOPs should include detailed, step-by-step procedures for conducting the maintenance and cleaning activities, including the following pipe maintenance activities: (1) preventive maintenance cleaning and blockage removal; (2) types of equipment to be used ("tiger tails," nozzles, screens/rakes, etc.); (3) guidelines and/or reference tables for appropriate jetting pressures and flows based on the type of jetting activity, type of pipe, size of pipe, age of pipe, and known condition of pipe; and (4) requirements for formally documenting pipe conditions, materials removed during cleaning, and other findings so the results can be reviewed, and if needed, evaluated by managerial staff. Maintenance activities and frequencies may need to be modified based on the review and evaluation of findings. The operation of high pressure sewer equipment without formal training and without SOPs can create serious safety issues and may significantly damage the structural integrity of the sewer pipe. Reference materials to support the development of the SOPs are available from various sources (equipment manufacturers, equipment vendors, professional associations, etc.), including references such as the National Association of Sewer Service Companies' *Jetter Code of Practices* (http://nassco.org/publications/p_techman.html), which provides guidelines for the proper operation of sewer jetter equipment.

This item has been placed on the agenda for action Monday evening. As of the time of packet distribution, the draft ordinance is not available. My being out of town has contributed to the delay in preparation, and Frank is researching several legal questions that the Mayor has requested.

Frank will want to discuss direction from the Council, so this item will be read for consideration first in Executive Session. Based on the direction that I think I heard from the Council at the last meeting, I have asked that Frank not prepare a Franchise Ordinance, but that the Ordinance be prepared to:

- 1. Repeal the exclusivity aspect of the current ordinance
- 2. Require that ambulance companies desiring to do business in the City, as a single requirement, register with the City and provide proof that they are licensed by the State of Texas to operate their business in Texas.

I understand that there may still be discussion on the matter Monday evening. Frank will provide legal consultation first in Executive Session.

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Whereas, the City of Rockwall Water Department employees provide safe clean drinking water that define the quality of life for residents and commercial organizations in the community; and

Whereas, water utility professionals must undergo extensive training and testing to ensure that proper procedures, testing, and methodology are used to ensure the water systems in our community are safe and have no threat to human life; and

Whereas, committed professionals in the water industry help in the establishment of a participatory, collaborative organization dedicated to continual learning and improvement; and

Whereas, committed employees such as Shon Bellah continually seek to improve their knowledge, helping to maintain a workforce that is competent, motivated, adaptive, and safe; and

Whereas, the State of Texas currently has 9,315 licensed operators to perform various water quality functions, with only 1,023 individuals having achieved a Class A certification.

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2. HOLD WORK SESSION TO DISCUSS THE CURRENT SOLID WASTE COLLECTION CONTRACT RENEWAL NEGOTIATIONS WITH REPUBLIC WASTE (ALLIED WASTE) AND TAKE ANY ACTION NECESSARY

Rick Burnis with Republic Waste came forth and briefed the council on a proposal currently being put forth regarding renewing the contract with his company for a period of an additional five years. Various comments were made regarding the city's current recycling program, including the more than 50% of residents who participate in recycling as well as current costs associated with the program. Discussion took place concerning the additional tonnage of garbage that might result if the recycling program went away entirely, as well as the need to consider associated cost implications that may result.

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3. HOLD WORK SESSION TO DISCUSS AND CONSIDER LOCAL REGULATIONS REGARDING NON-EMERGENCY AMBULANCE SERVICES AND ASSOCIATED TRANSPORTS, AND TAKE ANY ACTION NECESSARY.

City Manager Rick Crowley indicated that the council had previously instructed staff to 66 come back with an ordinance to become effective November 1, 2015 to essentially do 67 away with exclusivity of non-emergency EMS transfer services in the city. He went on to 68 69 explain that the city council may or may not wish to consider also adopting an ordinance to establish a franchise agreement with non-emergency transport service EMS providers 70 71 doing business in the city. He explained that the council must find that a public 72 necessity exists in order to enter into those sorts of ordinance-based franchise 73 agreements. Crowley indicated that associated with these sorts of franchise agreements 74 would be payment to the city from ambulance providers that equates to about 3.5-3.6% of their gross revenue. This amount is somewhat of an industry standard, and would be 75 76 owed to the city for the purpose of utilizing streets and roadways. The council may or 77 may not have an interest in these sorts of franchise agreements and may or may not 78 wish to regulate these providers. Staff is seeking direction from the council at this time.

79

Mayor Pro Tem Lewis indicated that he is not necessarily interested in entering into franchise agreements; however, he does wish to ensure that providers that may be operating in the city are qualified. Mr. Crowley indicated that the State already regulates EMS service providers; however, the Council may or may not wish to do some sort of regulating of its own. Brief discussion took place related to how and to what extent providers may be regulated.

86

Councilmember White indicated that he is against any sort of franchise fee, and he does
 not feel that the city should get involved in regulating ambulances since the state already
 licenses and regulates them.

90

91 Councilmember Hohenshelt asked if the city would take any steps, as far as regulation is concerned, beyond that which the state would already take to regulate such companies. 92 93 Mr. Crowley indicated that all that a franchise agreement would do is to allow the city to keep track of those companies doing business in our city, and a fee would be collected. 94 95 Mayor Pruitt also indicated that the companies that would be performing non-emergency 96 transport services in our city will also potentially impact the amount of annual funding the city will end up paying to the County of Rockwall Emergency Services Corporation 97 98 (ESC) for the annual 'emergency transport' services contract in place and managed 99 through the ESC.

Mayor Pro Tem Lewis indicated that he would like to hear some additional information from city attorney, Frank Garza, before making any sort of definitive decision on this topic. Councilmember Hohenshelt indicated that he would also like to better understand the cost implications, if possible.

104

105 Councilmember Fowler indicated that he believes the council should care, to some 106 extent, which providers are operating in our city, so he would like some additional 107 information before making any decisions as well.

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109 Mr. Crowley briefly explained the potential cost implications on annual subsidy paid to the ESC and ultimately passed on to the ambulance provider on contract with the ESC. 110 111 He shared that it will be difficult to determine cost implications, explaining that it will 112 depend on how often and to what extent businesses, such as the local hospitals and 113 nursing homes, continue to call the existing contractor to perform non-emergency 114 transports versus how often and to what extent they start calling other providers to 115 perform those services. He cautioned that if the council chooses to initiate a franchise agreement type of ordinance, then the previously expressed November 1 deadline for 116 implementation may need to be delayed. The council took no action related to this work 117 118 session item at this time, indicating they have a desire to hear more input from the city 119 attorney concerning what other cities have done, and to receive more information 120 overall.

Councilmember Lewis pulled item #5 for further discussion. Councilmember Milder then
made a motion to approve all remaining consent agenda items (except item #5) (#1, 2, 3,

passed by a vote of 7 ayes to 0 nays.

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252 Regarding Consent Agenda item #5, Councilmember Lewis asked if LaTerra has had any 253 delays in responding to the city throughout the course of the project. Mr. Tumulty, City 254 Engineer, indicated that he is not aware of any such delays, noting that the only delays 255 he is aware of have been related to bad weather. Councilmember Lewis questioned if it is necessary to pay LaTerra a continued monthly fee for an additional five month period, 256 257 or if perhaps staff may be able to handle the architectural oversight instead for that 258 period. Lewis generally indicated that he is not in favor of extending the oversight 259 period. 260

Mayor Pro Tem Lewis made a motion to instruct staff to handle the disputed claim and settle it; however, he does not wish to authorize continuation of \$3,300 / month for FIVE additional months. Councilmember Townsend seconded the motion. After various comments by council and staff, Councilmember Lewis repeated his motion – to offer La Terra Studio the amount of \$17,038.63 to settle the disputed amount due caused by ambiguous language in the existing contract and to not pay the additional \$16,500 (\$3,300 for five additional months) for monthly, architectural oversight of the project.

After brief comments, the motion passed by a vote of 6 in favor with 1 against (Fowler).

271 Open Forum was addressed next by the Mayor and Council.

273 XI. APPOINTMENTS

2751.Appointment with the Planning and Zoning Chairman to discuss and
answer any questions regarding cases on the agenda and related issues

Chairman, Craig Renfro, came forth and briefed the council on Planning-related items on
tonight's agenda, including recommendations of the Commission relative to those items.
He mentioned that P&Z board member, Wendi Conley, recently resigned. After his
remarks, the council took no action concerning this appointment item.

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Appointment with Todd Parks, Fixed Based Operator of the Ralph M. Hall
/ Rockwall Municipal Airport, to consider a request regarding modification
of operating hours, and take any action necessary.

Mr. Parks came forth and indicated that he is requesting that the council consider allowing him to adjust airport operating hours to be more in line with when demand for use of the airport is actually present versus when demand is negligible. If the adjusted hours are approved this evening, Mayor Pruitt encouraged Mr. Parks to come back to the council to further adjust the hours of operation should trends in demand change over time. Mr. Parks' written request to the Council indicated that he would like consideration to change the operating hours as follows:

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Monday through Friday - change opening time from 7:00 AM to 8:00 AM and closing time from 7:00 PM to 5:00 PM

Saturday - Change opening time from 7:00 AM to 8:00 AM and closing time from 7:00 PM to 4:00 PM.

Sunday - We currently open at 7:00 AM and close at 7:00 PM. We are requesting that the FBO be closed on Sundays.

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296 Mayor Pruitt made a motion to approve the request to adjust operating hours as 297 presented. Councilmember White seconded the motion, which, after brief comments, 298 passed by a vote of 7 in favor with 0 against.

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3. Appointment with Rockwall resident Jim Smith to hear concerns related to drones, and take any action necessary.

302 Mr. Smith came forth and thanked the council for their tireless work on behalf of citizens. 303 He went on to share that he was sitting on his back porch recently, and a drone flew into 304 the air space over his back yard. He expressed that he wishes to not address or attempt 305 to have the city regulate government or commercial drone use, but rather drones used 306 for hobby or recreational purposes (aka 'model aircraft'). He spoke to some of the 307 existing Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) 'guidelines' he has researched and found 308 to be in place, sharing that they are guidelines rather than regulations and that they seem 309 to still be evolving. He also has concerns about people using recreational drones 310 (unmanned aircraft) for the purpose of taking photos without someone's permission and 311 perhaps distributing those photos. He wants to maintain serenity and peacefulness in 312 Rockwall resident's back yards. He pointed out an existing section of the city's Code of Ordinances (Chapter 8. Aviation, Article II. Airport) that he feels could be used to prohibit 313 314 the use of recreational drones (aircraft). He also believes that Ch. 16 (Environment), 315 Article IV. (Noise) of the Code might also have some provisions that could be applied to 316 help regulate drones and maintain guite, peace and serenity in residents' back yards, for 317 example. Mr. Smith asked the council, staff and city attorney a series of questions, 318 including inquiries regarding if these sections of the Code of Ordinances mean that the 319 city already regulates drones, or if additional regulations should be established. 320

321 Following Mr. Smith's presentation, Mayor Pruitt thanked him for his comments, and the 322 city council took no action concerning this appointment item. 323

- 324 XII. PUBLIC HEARING ITEMS

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Hold a public hearing to receive comments regarding the proposed FY 1. 2015-2016 City of Rockwall budget, and take any action necessary.

328 Mr. Crowley provided the Council with a broad overview of some of the various recurring 329 and one-time expenses that are proposed to be funded in this upcoming budget, 330 including staff, programs and equipment. He explained that the proposed budget 331 assumes adoption of the effective tax rate. Mrs. Smith provided a brief overview of a 332 meeting recently held with staff, including herself, Brad Griggs, (Fire) Chief Poindexter and Battalion Chief Merritt. She shared some information concerning how it may be 333

possible to lower the Fire Department's overtime budget to free up some funds to hire
 some additional, full-time, paid staff. After lengthy discussion, Mayor Pruitt opened the
 public hearing and asked if anyone would like to come forth and speak at this time.
 There being no one, Mayor Pruitt then closed the public hearing. He indicated that
 Council will take formal action to adopt the budget at its September 21st meeting.

340 XIII. ACTION ITEMS

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Discuss and consider a recommendation of the City Council's Naming
 Sub-Committee regarding approval of a resolution renaming Camelot
 Court to Lynch Court, and take any action necessary.

345 Mayor Pruitt addressed this agenda item next, following the Proclamations portion of the 346 public meeting agenda. He called forth Mr. Lynch and his wife, introducing them and 347 sharing a detailed history of both Mr. Lynch's current volunteer involvement in the 348 community and to veterans, as well as his past military service to our country while serving in the U.S. Army. He shared that there are four homes located on what is now 349 350 known as Camelot Court, and all of the residents who live on that street have indicated 351 support for changing the name of the street to Lynch Court to honor Specialist Five 352 Joseph P. Lynch, Sr.

- Councilmember Lewis made a motion to move forward with changing the name of Camelot Court to Lynch Court. Councilmember Milder seconded the motion, which passed unanimously of council (7 ayes to 0 nays).
 - 2. Discuss and consider possible options for the solid waste contract, and take any action necessary.

Mr. Crowley provided background information related to this agenda item, reminding the
 Council and the public that this agenda item was discussed at greater length during a
 work session that was held earlier this afternoon.

Councilmember Milder indicated that he does not personally have any problem with the current service provider; however, he does feel that it is prudent to periodically go out for bid to explore other options in order to compare and ensure we are getting the best value for our dollars spent.

- Mayor Pro Tem Lewis shared that he has heard only one or two complaints about bulk
 trash pick-up; however, he believes these issues have been addressed. He shared that
 fuel costs and costs of things like tires are 'up' quite significantly lately.
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Mayor Pro Tem Lewis then made a motion to authorize the City Manager to execute contract renewal documents with Republic Waste and bring back a corresponding rate resolution for Council action at a later date. Councilmember Townsend seconded the motion, which passed by a vote of 6 in favor with 1 against (Milder).

3783.MIS2015-006 - Discuss and consider a request by Elias Pope of 8020379Restaurants, LLC for the approval of a variance to the parking380requirements in conjunction with an approved site plan for a restaurant on381a 0.90-acre parcel of land identified as Lot 3, Block A, Harbor District382Addition, City of Rockwall, Rockwall County, Texas, zoned Planned383Development District 32 (PD-32), situated within the IH-30 Overlay (IH-30

384 385 OV) District, located at the southeast corner of the IH-30 Frontage Road and Sunset Ridge Drive, and take any action necessary.

386 Planning Director Ryan Miller provided a brief synopsis of this agenda item and the 387 associated request. He stated that this item is associated with a 6,800 square foot 388 restaurant facility just north of Trend Tower. The applicant is showing 68 parking spaces 389 being provided with 53 being provided on site and an additional fifteen being provided 390 offsite in the Trend Tower parking garage. The applicant is now requesting that the 391 council consider waiving the additional 15, off-site parking spaces at Trend Tower, citing 392 that sufficient public parking is available within the sub-district. Councilmember Lewis 393 asked when public access to spaces located in Trend Tower begins. Mr. Crowley clarified that it starts at 5:00 p.m. Mr. Crowley clarified that the applicant is requesting to 394 395 be able to count "on street" and other public parking spaces towards his required 396 number of spaces. After brief comments, Councilmember White made a motion to approve the variance request for MIS2015-006. Mayor Pro Tem Lewis seconded the 397 398 motion, which passed by a vote of 7 ayes to 0 nays. 399

400 4. MIS2015-005 - Discuss and consider a request by Duane and Jennifer Piercy for the approval of an exception to the minimum masonry 401 requirements stipulated in Section 3.1, General Residential District 402 403 Standards, of Article V, District Development Standards, of the Unified 404 Development Code, for a 1.21-acre tract of land identified as Lot 1. Block 405 A, Piercy Place Addition, City of Rockwall, Rockwall County, Texas, 406 zoned Single Family 7 (SF-7) District, addressed as 713 Hartman Street, 407 and take any action necessary.

408 Mr. Miller provided brief background information related to this agenda item, indicating 409 that the applicant would like to request a variance to allow him/her to utilize 100% hardy plank material instead of the city's current masonry standards (required to use 80% 410 411 masonry with a maximum of 50% being dedicated to hardy plank, stucco or other cement-like materials). However, the code does allow for the council to grant variances 412 413 at its discretion. He explained that this home is located near the adjacent historic 414 district, so it would be in line with some of the other homes in the area. The P&Z 415 Commission has recommended approval of this agenda item. Councilmember White made a motion to approve the variance request for MIS2015-005. Mayor Pro Tem Lewis 416 417 seconded the motion, which passed by a vote of 7 ayes to 0 nays.

Regarding the next two agenda items (Action item #5 and #6), Mayor Pruitt announced
 that Councilmember Hohenshelt has recused himself and has filed an affidavit, as
 required, with the City Secretary.

4215.Discuss and consider a motion for reconsideration regarding the Chapter422212 Development Agreement approved with Joey Howell on August 3,4232015 for the property within the City of Rockwall's Extraterritorial424Jurisdiction (ETJ), located south of SH-276 on the east side of FM-548,425being a ~98-acre tract of land, and take any action necessary.

426 Mr. Crowley, City Manager, provided some background information related to this 427 agenda item, generally summarizing his memo and pointing out that Mr. Howell 428 submitted an e-mail that has been included in council members' informational meeting 429 packet. He summarized that the County has expressed some opposition to approval of 430 this 212 Development Agreement on the part of the city. He further indicated that the 431 County recently disapproved Mr. Howell's variance request. As such, City Manager 432 Crowley explained that, although the council had authorized him to execute the 212 433 agreement at a previous council meeting, he did not yet move forward with signing said 434 document. At this point, since there seems to be some opposition from the County, as 435 well as some unknown eventual outcomes at the county level concerning this topic, Mr. 436 Howell came forth and indicated that he is in support of the city council rescinding its 437 previous action whereby it authorized the city manager to execute the 212 agreement.

438 Councilmember White made a motion for reconsideration of the 212 agreement.
439 Councilmember Townsend seconded the motion, which, after brief comments, passed by
440 a vote of 6 in favor with 1 recusal (Hohenshelt).

The amended language clarifies that the resolution authorizes the City Manager to act on behalf of the City in dealing with the Texas and Parks and Wildlife Department regarding the program assurances and grant contracts. This amendment is necessary to ensure that signature authorities are appropriately delegated and authorized going forward regarding the grant program process.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCKWALL. TEXAS. AFFIRMING APPLICATION FOR GRANT FUNDING THROUGH THE TEXAS PARKS AND WILDLIFE DEPARTMENT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF A BOATING ACCESS FACILITY ON LAKE RAY HUBBARD NEAR SH-66 AND N. LAKESHORE DRIVE; DESIGNATING CERTAIN OFFICIALS AS BEING RESPONSIBLE FOR, ACTING FOR, AND ON BEHALF OF THE "SPONSOR" IN DEALING WITH THE TEXAS PARKS & WILDLIFE PROVIDING APPROPRIATIONS DEPARTMENT: FOR AND MATCHING FUNDS; PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the "Sponsor" is desirous of authorizing an official to represent and act for the "Sponsor" in dealing with the "Department" concerning the "Program."

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCKWALL, TEXAS, THAT:

<u>Section</u> 1. the Rockwall City Council, in meeting this 8th day of September, 2015, is hereby eligible for assistance and will enter into a project agreement with the Department to provide for said construction on a reimbursement basis, with the Sponsor providing 25% by appropriations or in-kind services, and the Department providing 75% matching funds for work accomplished; and

Section 2. that the "Sponsor" hereby authorizes and directs its City Manager, Rick Crowley, to act for the "Sponsor" in dealing with the "Department" for the purpose of the "Program," and Rick Crowley is hereby officially designated as the representative in this regard; and

Section 3. the Sponsor has matching funds available; and

<u>Section 4.</u> the Sponsor will operate said facility; perform all necessary maintenance and repairs to ensure public use, health and safety; and provide security surveillance to eliminate creations of nuisance or hazard to the public or adjacent property owners for the life of the facility (minimum 25 years); and

<u>Section 5.</u> said facility will be open at all reasonable times to the public, and that revenue from any user fees will only be used to offset operation and maintenance costs of any supported facilities.

SUBJECT:	Engineering Flood Study Review Contract Extension

The City of Rockwall's storm drainage system encompasses 14 separate watersheds (52 stream miles) located totally or partially within the corporate limits of the City. These watersheds have been analyzed for existing and fully developed conditions. Whenever a development occurs that potentially impacts any floodplain area, development standards requires a registered engineer to perform a flood study to determine the impacts to the floodplain and an engineering solution that minimizes the increase of water surface elevations and velocities. A flood study review fee was implemented in 2013 by the City for developments requiring a flood study to recoup our review cost. The City uses Hydrological Support Services, LLC. to perform reviews to verify City drainage requirement compliance. Their contract expires on September 30, 2015. Staff has been satisfied with their service and recommends extending the contract another year.

Staff requests consideration of approval of the engineering services contract with Hydrological Support Services, LLC to perform flood study reviews for developments within the City in an amount not to exceed \$40,000.00. Funding will be provided from the FY 2015-16 Department Operations Budget and developer reimbursement. If you have any questions, please advise.

PROFESSIONAL ENGINEERING SERVICES CONTRACT

This Agreement is made and entered into in Rockwall County, Texas, between City of Rockwall, Texas ("CITY"), a municipal corporation and political subdivision of the State of Texas, acting by and through its City Manager and HydroLogical Support Services, LLC, ("ENGINEER"), located at 97 Old Turkey Farm Rd, Denison, Texas, Engineer duly licensed and practicing under the laws of the State of Texas.

WHEREAS, CITY desires to engage Engineer as an independent contractor to render certain technical and professional services necessary for performing:

PROFESSIONAL ENGINEERING SERVICES for Miscellaneous Consulting Services.

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements contained herein, the Parties hereby agree as follows:

1. Scope of Work

Engineer agrees to perform professional engineering services as specifically defined in this Contract as Exhibit "A" and as authorized by CITY. Specifically, Engineer shall perform Professional services as requested by CITY and detailed in Exhibit "A".

The Parties by mutual agreement through contract amendments may provide for additional technical and professional services to be performed under the basic general terms and conditions of this Contract. CITY reserves the right to enter into another agreement with other engineering firms to provide the same or similar professional services during the term of this Contract for different projects.

2. Compensation & Term of Agreement

Cost for such services will be an annual amount not to exceed forty thousand dollars (\$40,000.00) and billed as an hourly basis per rates provided in Exhibit "B". Engineer is not authorized to perform any work beyond the limited not to exceed amount without authorized written approval by CITY.

The term of this Agreement shall commence upon execution of this agreement and follow the schedule described in Exhibit "C". In the event of termination, Engineer will assist the CITY in

arranging a smooth transition process. However, Engineer's obligation to provide services to the CITY will cease upon the effective date of termination, unless otherwise agreed in writing.

3. Method of Payment

CITY shall pay Engineer its fees based on the presentation by Engineer to CITY of a correct monthly statement for all the amounts earned under the Contract together with reasonable supporting documentation verifying the accuracy of the fees and expenses. CITY shall then pay Engineer its fee within thirty (30) days after presentation of the accurate monthly statement by Engineer to CITY. CITY is a State sales and use tax exempt political subdivision of the State of Texas. All records supporting payment shall be kept in the offices of Engineer for a period of not less than three (3) years and shall be made available to CITY for inspection, audit or copying upon reasonable request.

4. Engineer's Standard of Care

Engineer shall provide its services under this Contract with the same degree of care, skill and diligence as is ordinarily provided by a professional Engineer under similar circumstances for a similar project. Engineer represents that it has the capability, experience, available personnel, and means required to perform the services contemplated by this Contract. Services will be performed using personnel and equipment qualified and/or suitable to perform the work requested by the CITY. CITY retains the right to report to Engineer any unsatisfactory performance of Engineer personnel for appropriate corrective action. Engineer shall comply with applicable federal, state, and local laws in connection with any work performed hereunder.

Engineer will seek written CITY approval to accept any contract or perform any services for any person, entity, or business that has an agreement or is in negotiations of an agreement with CITY. CITY may waive this conflict, but such waiver is at CITY's sole discretion and its decision shall be final.

5. Ownership of Documents

As part of the total compensation which CITY has agreed to pay Engineer for the professional services to be rendered under this Contract, Engineer agrees that hard copies of all finished and unfinished documents, data, studies, surveys, drawings, specifications, field notes, maps, models, photographs, preliminary reports, reports, bid packet/construction contract documents/advertisement for bids incorporating any CITY standard provisions provided by Engineer, will remain the property of the CITY. Engineer will furnish CITY with paper and electronic copies, to the extent they are available, of all of the foregoing to facilitate coordination; however, ownership of the underlying work product shall remain the intellectual property of the Engineer. Engineer shall have the right to use such work products for Engineer's purposes. However, such documents are not intended to be suitable for reuse by CITY or others on extension of the Project or on any other project. Any reuse without the express written consent of the Engineer will

be at reuser's sole risk and without liability or legal exposure to the Engineer, and CITY to the extent allowed by law, shall hold harmless the Engineer from all claims, damages, losses, expenses, and costs, including attorneys' fees arising out of or resulting from the reuse of said documents without the Engineer's consent. The granting of such consent will entitle the Engineer to further compensation at rates to be agreed upon by CITY and the Engineer. The above notwithstanding, Engineer shall retain all rights in its standard drawing details, designs, specifications, databases, computer software and any other proprietary and intellectual property information provided pursuant to this Contract, whether or not such proprietary information was modified during the course of providing the services.

6. Insurance

A. Engineer agrees to maintain Worker's Compensation and Employer's Liability Insurance to cover all of its own personnel engaged in performing services for CITY under this Contract in at least the following amounts:

> Workmen's Compensation – Statutory Employer's Liability – \$100,000.00 Bodily Injury by Disease - \$500,000 (policy limits) Bodily Injury by Disease - \$100,000 (each employee)

B. Engineer also agrees to maintain Commercial General Liability, Business Automobile Liability, and Umbrella Liability Insurance covering claims against Engineer for damages resulting from bodily injury, death or property damages from accidents arising in the course of work performed under this Contract in not less than the following amounts:

\$2,000,000.00 General aggregate limit

\$1,000,000.00 each occurrence sub-limit for all bodily injury or property damage incurred all in one occurrence

\$1,000,000.00 each occurrence sub-limit for Personal Injury and Advertising

C. Engineer shall add CITY, its City Council members and employees, as an additional insureds on all required insurance policies, except worker's compensation, employer's liability and errors and omissions insurance. The Commercial General Liability Policy and Umbrella Liability Policy shall be of an "occurrence" type policy.

D. Engineer shall furnish CITY with an Insurance Certificate on the date this Contract is executed and accepted by CITY, which confirms that all above required insurance policies are in full force and effect.

E. Engineer agrees to maintain errors and omissions professional liability insurance in the amount of not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) annual aggregate, on a claims made basis for a period of two years after termination of this contract, as long as reasonably available under standard policies.

7. INDEMNIFICATION

ENGINEER SHALL INDEMNIFY AND SAVE HARMLESS THE CITY AND ITS CITY COUNCIL MEMBERS AND EMPLOYEES FROM SUITS, ACTIONS, LOSSES, DAMAGES, CLAIMS, OR LIABILITY, INCLUDING WITHOUT LIMITING THE GENERALITY OF THE FOREGOING, ALL EXPENSES OF LITIGATION, COURT COSTS, AND REASONABLE ATTORNEY'S FEES FOR INJURY OR DEATH TO ANY PERSON, OR INJURY TO ANY PROPERTY, RECEIVED OR SUSTAINED BY ANY PERSON OR PERSONS OR PROPERTY, TO THE EXTENT CAUSED BY THE NEGLIGENT ACTS OF ENGINEER OR EMPLOYEES OR ANYONE FOR WHOM THE ENGINEER IS LEGALLY LIABLE FOR, IN THE EXECUTION OF PERFORMANCE OF THIS CONTRACT.

ENGINEER'S TOTAL LIABILITY TO CITY FOR ANY LOSS OR DAMAGES FROM CLAIMS ARISING OUT OF, OR IN CONNECTION WITH, THIS CONTRACT FROM ANY CAUSE INCLUDING ENGINEER'S STRICT LIABILITY, BREACH OF CONTRACT, OR PROFESSIONAL NEGLIGENCE, ERRORS AND OMISSIONS SHALL-NOT EXCEED ONE MILLION DOLLARS (\$1,000,000.00). NEITHER PARTY TO THIS AGREEMENT SHALL BE LIABLE TO THE OTHER PARTY OR ANY THIRD PARTY CLAIMING THROUGH THE OTHER RESPECTIVE PARTY, FOR ANY SPECIAL, INCIDENTAL, INDIRECT, PUNITIVE, LIQUIDATED, DELAY OR CONSEQUENTIAL DAMAGES OF ANY KIND INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO LOST PROFITS OR USE OF PROPERTY, FACILITIES OR RESOURCES, THAT MAY RESULT FROM THIS AGREEMENT, OR OUT OF ANY GOODS OR SERVICES FURNISHED HEREUNDER.

CITY and Engineer each binds itself and its successors, executors, administrators and assigns to the other parties of this Contract and to the successors, executors, administrators and assigns of such other parties, in respect to all covenants of this Contract. Except as noted in the first part of this Paragraph, neither CITY nor Engineer shall assign, sublet or transfer its interest in this Contract without the written consent of the other. Engineer and CITY may terminate this Contract for their convenience at any time by giving at least thirty (30) days notice in writing to each other. If this Contract is terminated due to the fault of Engineer, Paragraph 10 hereof, relative to Termination for Cause, shall apply.

11. Changes

CITY may, from time to time, request changes in the Scope of Work of **Engineer** to be performed hereunder. Such changes, including any increase or decrease in the amount of **Engineer**'s compensation, or time for performance, which are mutually agreed upon by and between **CITY** and **Engineer**, shall be incorporated in written amendments to this Contract. Any subsequent contract amendments shall be executed by the City Manager or other authorized representative as designated by the City Manager or City Council.

Any alterations, additions or deletions to the terms of this Contract, including the scope of work, shall be by amendment **in writing** executed by both CITY and Contractor.

This Contract is governed by the laws of the State of Texas and all obligations of the parties under this Contract are performable in Rockwall County, Texas.

19. Attorney's Fees

If it is necessary for either Party herein to file a cause of action at law or in equity against the other Party due to: (a) a breach of this Contract by the other Party and/or (b) any intentional and/or negligent act or omission by the other Party arising out of this Contract, the non-breaching or non-negligent Party shall be entitled to reasonable attorney's fees and costs, and any necessary disbursements, in addition to any other relief to which it is legally entitled.

20. State or Federal Laws

This Contract is subject to all applicable federal and state laws, statutes, codes, and any applicable permits, ordinances, rules, orders and regulations of any local, state or federal government authority having or asserting jurisdiction, but nothing contained herein shall be construed as a waiver of any right to question or contest any such law, ordinance, order, rule or regulation in any forum having jurisdiction.

Miscellaneous Consulting Services

The scope of services for this contract is for HydroLogical Support Services, LLC (HSS) to provide miscellaneous consulting services on an as-needed basis for issues related to stormwater and other water resources matters, which may be requested from time to time by, or approved by, the City of Rockwall's City Engineer/Public Works Director, or by the City Engineer's/Public Works Director's representative(s) or assistant(s). Such services are anticipated to typically consist of the following:

- 1. Review of proposed development projects and other proposed construction within the City on issues related to drainage, flood hazard potential, and regulatory issues, and provide review comments to the City.
- 2. Consultation or coordination with project owners and their representatives, and provide readilyavailable City data and other information pertinent to general location of their proposed or existing projects.
- 3. Provide opinions, advice, recommendations and other miscellaneous assistance to the City regarding drainage, flood hazard protection, and regulatory issues related to water resources.
- 4. Other miscellaneous services as requested by the City and agreed by HSS provided that such services are within the field of expertise of HSS.

<u>Exclusions</u>: Engineering design, design plans, construction plans, construction inspection, construction administration, surveying, geotechnical services, environmental services, groundwater services, water quality services, and any other services which are not within the field of expertise or services offered by HSS are specifically excluded from this scope of services.

This scope of services is to be provided on a time and materials cost basis in accordance with attached rate schedule (Exhibit "B"). The termination date of this contract is September 30, 2016, unless agreed in writing by both parties to extend this contract, or unless either party gives notice to other party to terminate this contract prior to this termination date.

Personnel rates are effective through September 30, 2016, and may be renegotiated for services performed thereafter.

Non-labor expenses (including sub-contractual services, if any) will be invoiced at cost plus 8%. Mileage costs will be at the same rate as established by the Internal Revenue Service at the time of occurrence. In-office black-and-white photocopies directly related to a project or task and exceeding more than 50 pages will be at a cost of 10 cents each. Color copies will be at a cost of 25 cents each for 8.5x11 size and 50 cents each for 11x17 size.

Invoices will be submitted to the City typically at the end of the month and on a monthly basis.. However, the final invoice will be submitted upon termination of this contract. Payment for each invoice is due "net 30" days following date of the invoice. Delayed payment of any invoice may result in delays of the contracted services (Exhibit "A").

Unless otherwise agreed in writing to extend this contract, or unless either party to this contract gives notice to terminate, this contract will terminate on September 30, 2016.

Earlier this year the City of Rockwall was approved as a *Preserve America Community* by the *Advisory Council on Historic Preservation*, which administers the *Preserve America* program for the Department of the Interior. In recognition of this achievement, the City of Rockwall received an official roadway sign indicating this designation. In order to install the signage along SH-66 [*W. Rusk Street*] the City will need to enter into an agreement with the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) through the City Pride Program. As part of this agreement, it will be the responsibility of the City to provide and install the signage, pole and base once the proposed locations have been approved by TxDOT. Attached to this email is a copy of the City Pride Program agreement, a map showing the proposed location for the new signage, and TxDOT's standard signage plans.

The Engineering Department estimates the cost of installing the sign at approximately ~\$250.00. Should the City Council consider authorizing the City Manager to enter into an agreement with TxDOT under the City Pride Program, staff will complete and submit the attached agreement to the state for consideration.

THIS AGREEMENT, made on the dates hereinafter shown, by and between the State of Texas, hereinafter called the "State," represented by the Executive Director of the Texas Department of Transportation, acting for and in behalf of the Texas Transportation Commission, and the City of ______, hereinafter called the "City."

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, the State owns, operates, and maintains a system of highways for public use and benefit, in the City of _____; and

WHEREAS, the City desires and has requested authority to construct or have reconstructed the City Pride Sign along the roadway(s) of:



at the location(s) shown on construction plans, attached hereto and made part of this Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises and of the mutual covenants and agreements of the parties hereto, to be by them respectively kept and performed as hereinafter set forth, and in accordance with Title 43, Texas Administrative Code, Chapter 25, Subchapter H, it is agreed as follows:

AGREEMENT

Article 1. General

The State grants to the City permission to construct or to have reconstructed, the City Pride Sign(s) within the right-of-way as shown on construction plans and to be maintained by the City as stipulated in the Municipal Maintenance Agreement with the City of ______, dated ______, 20____.

Article 2. Plans, Specifications and Construction Procedures

A. The City, at no cost to the State, shall prepare or have prepared, complete construction drawings, plans and specifications for the proposed City Pride Sign(s), State approved breakaway sign supports, foundations, appurtenances, and incidental items. No construction work shall be performed on highway right-of-way until these plans and specifications have been approved in writing by the State. After such approval has been given, no changes or alterations shall be made without the written approval of the State.

B. The plans and specifications shall be submitted to the District Engineer, Texas Department of Transportation, (TxDOT District), Texas for approval. Any changes or alterations which become necessary during the course of the work shall also be submitted to the District Engineer for approval.

C. The City, its contractor(s), or agents shall submit a traffic control plan as required and in accordance with the Texas Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices to direct and

protect vehicular and pedestrian traffic while construction work, including related activities, is in progress. Details and descriptions of these traffic handling measures shall be included in the plans and specifications when submitted for approval. If, during construction, it becomes necessary or desirable to modify the traffic control measures as specified, prior approval must be obtained from the State's District Engineer in (TxDOT District).

D. The City shall construct, or have constructed, at its entire cost and expense, the proposed City Pride Sign(s) and incidental items referred to in paragraph 1 and 2 above. The State shall have the right to inspect the work on highway right-of-way at any time during the progress of the work, and to make final inspection upon completion. Construction operations will be conducted in a manner acceptable to the District Engineer or their authorized representative. The City, its contractor(s) or agents shall correct any deficiencies revealed by the State's inspection of the work or of the traffic control and protection measures, where such deficiencies could have an adverse affect on public use of the highway or the safety and convenience of the traveling public.

E. Upon completion of the work authorized herein, the City shall submit copies of the asbuilt plans and specifications, including any changes or alterations, showing the City Pride Sign(s) in their completed state within 45 days to the State's District Engineer in (TxDOT District) for permanent records of the State.

F. The City agrees to pay all damages accruing to the State, by reason of injuries to the right-of-way, roadbed, pavement, and/or bridge owned by the State, when such damages are caused by the city's construction, operations, maintenance or rehabilitation on said roadway. Whenever funds are paid by the City to the State under this Agreement, the City shall remit a check or warrant made payable to the "Texas Department of Transportation Trust Fund." To the extent allowed by law, the City also agrees to indemnify and save harmless the State from any and all claims, demands, actions or causes of action, due to damage to property or injury to or death of persons arising from or growing out of or in any manner connected with work on said roadway project including, but not limited to, all court costs, attorney fees and other expenses incurred in connection with suits for such damage and shall, if so requested in writing, assist or relieve the State from defending any such suits brought against it. In addition, the City shall require its contractor(s) and subcontractor(s) to secure a policy of insurance in the maximum statutory limits for tort liability, naming the State as an additional insured under its terms, and maintain the required insurance coverages in full force and effect during any period that work is performed on the State right-of-way. Adequate insurance, as a minimum, shall mean the City contractor(s) shall furnish the State with the Texas Department of Transportation's Certificate of Insurance covering the below listed insurance coverages.

The State shall be included as an "Additional Insured" by Endorsement to policies issued for coverages listed in B and C above. A "Waiver of Subrogation Endorsement" in favor of the State shall be a part of each policy for coverages listed in A, B, and C above. A certified copy of these endorsements shall be submitted to the State with the evidence of coverage. The City and/or its contractor(s) shall be responsible for any deductions stated in the policy.

Article 3. Location

A. One City Pride and/or a Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ), Texas Historical Commission (THC), Keep Texas Beautiful (KTB) Sign shall be allowed per eligible highway entrance to the City. A City Pride Sign shall be located on the right-hand side of the roadway unless otherwise approved in writing by the State. A City Pride Sign shall be located between 300 and 800 feet of the city limits at a location approved by the State. A City Pride Sign shall take advantage of the natural terrain, have the least impact on the scenic environment, avoid visual conflict within the State highway right-of-way, have a lateral offset greater than existing guide signs, not block the motorist's view of existing traffic control signs, and be placed in locations other than hanging above the highway.

B. A City Pride Sign shall not be located adjacent to the main lanes of full controlled access highway; however, a City Pride Sign may be located on the right-hand side of the access road.

C. The city may landscape the area adjacent to the City Pride Sign(s) upon written approval of the plans by the State's District Engineer in the (TxDOT District) District. Only small plants, flowers, and shrubbery will be allowed. Permanent structures or items such as large stones, masonry, berms, landscape timbers, etc. shall not be allowed. The State assumes no responsibility for watering, maintenance or damage due to State maintenance and construction activities, fire, theft or vandalism.

Article 4. City Pride Sign

A. The sign face of a City Pride Sign or the combined total area of the attachment signs displayed shall not exceed 80 square feet total. A City Pride Sign shall not contain words, symbols, or messages that:

- 1) May be construed as advertising, including, but not limited to, the offering of products and services.
- 2) Contain notification of municipal ordinances or regulations, or
- 3) Resemble official traffic control devices.

B. Banners, flags, streamers, flashing lights, or other appurtenances shall not be attached to a City Pride Sign or sign supports. Sign supports shall be galvanized metal or painted solid white.

C. A City Pride Sign shall not be illuminated internally or externally.

D. A City pride Sign may contain the name of the city, message, or slogan no greater than eight inches in height. The City may include a seal or symbol that is commonly used to represent the City.

E. If a City Pride Sign requires background material, it shall be painted brown (Sherwin Williams #2315 or equivalent) or have brown reflective material affixed to the sign face meeting State specifications. Lettering upon the brown background shall be white and may be any script or font. A white 2 inch border is optional. Lettering and border shall be



painted white (Sherwin Williams #2130 or equivalent) or have white reflective material affixed to the sign face meeting State specifications.

Article 5. Attachment Signs

A. Attachment signs or civic information signs are provided by a non-profit civic organization or governmental entity that display points of interest or geographical, recreational, cultural, or civic information. A civic organization must be located within or have a member who resides in the City, and complies with all applicable law concerning the provisions of public accommodation without regard to race, religion, color, sex, or national origin.

B. Attachment signs may be any color or combination of colors and may be in any design or shape. Attachment signs shall not be greater than 48 inches in width and 36 inches in height, and shall not consist of text, symbols, trademarks or a legend message identifying the name or abbreviation of a commercial establishment, service or product, or contain supplemental address or directional information such as meeting dates or locations.

C. A civic organization shall apply to the City for permission to display an attachment sign upon the City Pride Sign. The City shall notify/contact the civic organization in writing if the civic organization does not meet the requirements of eligibility as stated herein. The civic organization shall have 30 calendar days after written notification to meet the requirements herein.

D. The City shall approve all attachment signs and determine the order, arrangement, and duration of display. Attachment signs shall be placed upon a City Pride Sign and shall not overlap.

E. A civic organization shall have only one attachment sign per City Pride Sign unless the City and civic organization agree to said organization's multiple attachment signs upon a City Pride Sign.

F. The City shall remove an attachment sign of a participating civic organization if the civic organization ceases to exist, does not meet the requirements stated herein, or has not provided a replacement sign after 60 days of the City or State's written notification that the attachment sign is damaged, broken, faded, or has become a hazard due to failure to build to specifications, inclement weather, inadequate maintenance, accidental damage, or other cause.

Article 6. Miscellaneous

A. Signs from the TCEQ, THC, or KTB, Proud Community Program signs, shall be erected and maintained to State specifications at the sole expense of the City. Signs shall not be allowed as attachments to State signs or sign supports.

B. Attachment signs not relocated to a City Pride Sign, TCEQ, THC, or KTB signs or other approved locations will be removed by the State at the expense of the City.

C. The State shall not require fees from the City for participating in the City Pride Sign Program. The city shall not require fees from the civic organizations or governmental entities for display upon a City Pride Sign.

D. While installing or maintaining a City Pride Sign, the City shall cooperate with any State contractor working on the State highway system at that location.

E. In the event that the State determines that it is necessary to repair, construct, reconstruct and/or make any changes in the highway facility for reasons other than those specified herein, the City shall be responsible for all costs necessary for removal and relocation of the City Pride Sign.

F. The City shall remove a City Pride Sign if it has not provided a replacement sign within 60 calendar days of written notification from the State that the sign is damaged. broken, faded or has become a hazard due to failure to build to specifications, inclement weather, inadequate maintenance, accidental or other cause. After 60 days, the City Pride Sign not removed or replaced will be removed by the State at the expense of the city. The State may terminate this agreement upon default of the city.

G. This Agreement shall bind, and shall be for the sole and exclusive benefit of the respective parties and their legal successors.

SUBJECT: Signal Ridge Sanitary Sewer Pipe-Bursting Project

Signal Ridge sanitary sewer line carries flow from the PD-32 development to the Buffalo Creek Sanitary Sewer Trunk Main. As a part of the Wastewater Impact Fee Update Process and the Master Wastewater Study, a 1075 linear foot section of the Signal Ridge 10 inch diameter sanitary sewer line requires upsizing to a 14 inch diameter line to handle future flows. With the improvements occurring to the Signal Ridge Lift Station in the very near future to meet future development, this line needs to be increased at this time.

Staff requested a proposal from Grantham & Associates, Inc. to provide the engineering design and specifications for the replacement of this sanitary sewer line. The method of replacement to increase line capacity will be the pipe-bursting method. This method is considered a trenchless form of construction and should expedite construction if the existing line is on-grade and has limited number of sanitary sewer service connections.

The preliminary cost estimate to reconstruct this section of sanitary sewer line is \$229,500 with an engineering fee of \$27,480. Funds are available from the 2016 water and sewer revenue bonds. Staff recommends City Council consideration to award a professional services contract to Grantham & Associates, Inc. to perform the engineering design services and specifications for the Signal Ridge Sanitary Sewer Pipe Bursting Project in an amount of \$27,480.00 and take any action necessary. PROFESSIONAL ENGINEERING SERVICES CONTRACT

This Agreement is made and entered into in Rockwall County, Texas, between City of Rockwall, Texas ("CITY"), a municipal corporation and political subdivision of the State of Texas, acting by and through its City Manager and Grantham & Associates, Inc., ("ENGINEER"), located at 6570 Naaman Forest Boulevard, Suite 200, LB 2, Garland, Texas 75044, Engineers duly licensed and practicing under the laws of the State of Texas.

WHEREAS, CITY desires to engage Engineer as an independent contractor to render certain technical and professional services necessary for performing:

PROFESSIONAL ENGINEERING SERVICES for SIGNAL RIDGE SANITARY SEWER PIPE BURSTING

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements contained herein, the Parties hereby agree as follows:

1. <u>Scope of Work</u>

Engineer agrees to perform professional engineering services as specifically defined in this Contract as Exhibit "A" and as authorized by CITY. Specifically, Engineer shall perform Professional services as requested by CITY and detailed in Attachment "A".

The Parties by mutual agreement through contract amendments may provide for additional technical and professional services to be performed under the basic general terms and conditions of this Contract. CITY reserves the right to enter into another agreement with other engineering firms to provide the same or similar professional services during the term of this Contract for different projects.

2. Compensation & Term of Agreement

Cost for such services will be an annual amount not to exceed twenty nine thousand, nine hundred and twenty dollars (\$29,920.00) and billed as an hourly basis per rates provided in Attachment "A". Engineer is not authorized to perform any work beyond the limited not to exceed amount without authorized written approval by CITY.

The term of this Agreement shall commence upon execution of this agreement and follow the

schedule described in Attachment "B". In the event of termination, Engineer will assist the CITY in arranging a smooth transition process. However, Engineer's obligation to provide services to the CITY will cease upon the effective date of termination, unless otherwise agreed in writing.

3. <u>Method of Payment</u>

CITY shall pay Engineer its fees based on the presentation by Engineer to CITY of a correct monthly statement for all the amounts earned under the Contract together with reasonable supporting documentation verifying the accuracy of the fees and expenses. CITY shall then pay Engineer its fee within thirty (30) days after presentation of the accurate monthly statement by Engineer to CITY. CITY is a State sales and use tax exempt political subdivision of the State of Texas. All records supporting payment shall be kept in the offices of Engineer for a period of not less than three (3) years and shall be made available to CITY for inspection, audit or copying upon reasonable request.

4. Engineer's Standard of Care

Engineer shall provide its services under this Contract with the same degree of care, skill and diligence as is ordinarily provided by a professional Engineer under similar circumstances for a similar project. Engineer represents that it has the capability, experience, available personnel, and means required to perform the services contemplated by this Contract. Services will be performed using personnel and equipment qualified and/or suitable to perform the work requested by the CITY. CITY retains the right to report to Engineer any unsatisfactory performance of Engineer personnel for appropriate corrective action. Engineer shall comply with applicable federal, state, and local laws in connection with any work performed hereunder.

Engineer will seek written CITY approval to accept any contract or perform any services for any person, entity, or business that has an agreement or is in negotiations of an agreement with CITY. CITY may waive this conflict, but such waiver is at CITY's sole discretion and its decision shall be final.

5. Ownership of Documents

As part of the total compensation which CITY has agreed to pay Engineer for the professional services to be rendered under this Contract, Engineer agrees that hard copies of all finished and unfinished documents, data, studies, surveys, drawings, specifications, field notes, maps, models, photographs, preliminary reports, reports, bid packet/construction contract documents/advertisement for bids incorporating any CITY standard provisions provided by Engineer, will remain the property of the CITY. Engineer will furnish CITY with paper and electronic copies, to the extent they are available, of all of the foregoing to facilitate coordination, however, ownership of the underlying work product shall remain the intellectual property of the Engineer. Engineer shall have the right to use such work products for Engineer's purposes. However, such documents are not intended to be suitable for reuse by CITY or others on extension of the

Project or on any other project. Any reuse without the express written consent of the Engineer will be at reuser's sole risk and without liability or legal exposure to the Engineer, and CITY to the extent allowed by law, shall hold harmless the Engineer from all claims, damages, losses, expenses, and costs, including attorneys' fees arising out of or resulting from the reuse of said documents without the Engineer's consent. The granting of such consent will entitle the Engineer to further compensation at rates to be agreed upon by CITY and the Engineer. The above notwithstanding, Engineer shall retain all rights in its standard drawing details, designs, specifications, databases, computer software and any other proprietary and intellectual property information provided pursuant to this Contract, whether or not such proprietary information was modified during the course of providing the services.

6. <u>Insurance</u>

A. Engineer agrees to maintain Worker's Compensation and Employer's Liability Insurance to cover all of its own personnel engaged in performing services for CITY under this Contract in at least the following amounts:

> Workmen's Compensation – Statutory Employer's Liability – \$100,000.00 Bodily Injury by Disease - \$500,000 (policy limits) Bodily Injury by Disease - \$100,000 (each employee)

B. Engineer also agrees to maintain Commercial General Liability, Business Automobile Liability, and Umbrella Liability Insurance covering claims against Engineer for damages resulting from bodily injury, death or property damages from accidents arising in the course of work performed under this Contract in not less than the following amounts:

\$2,000,000.00 General aggregate limit

\$1,000,000.00 each occurrence sub-limit for all bodily injury or property damage incurred all in one occurrence

\$1,000,000.00 each occurrence sub-limit for Personal Injury and Advertising

C. Engineer shall add CITY, its City Council members and employees, as an additional insureds on all required insurance policies, except worker's compensation, employer's liability and errors and omissions insurance. The Commercial General Liability Policy and Umbrella Liability Policy shall be of an "occurrence" type policy.

D. Engineer shall furnish CITY with an Insurance Certificate on the date this Contract is executed and accepted by CITY, which confirms that all above required insurance policies are in full force and effect.

E. Engineer agrees to maintain errors and omissions professional liability insurance in the amount of not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) annual aggregate, on a claims made basis, as long as reasonably available under standard policies.

7. **INDEMNIFICATION**

ENGINEER SHALL INDEMNIFY AND SAVE HARMLESS THE CITY AND ITS CITY COUNCIL MEMBERS AND EMPLOYEES FROM SUITS, ACTIONS, LOSSES, DAMAGES, CLAIMS, OR LIABILITY, INCLUDING WITHOUT LIMITING THE GENERALITY OF THE FOREGOING, ALL EXPENSES OF LITIGATION, COURT COSTS, AND REASONABLE ATTORNEY'S FEES FOR INJURY OR DEATH TO ANY PERSON, OR INJURY TO ANY PROPERTY, RECEIVED OR SUSTAINED BY ANY PERSON OR PERSONS OR PROPERTY, TO THE EXTENT CAUSED BY THE NEGLIGENT ACTS OF ENGINEER OR ITS AGENTS OR EMPLOYEES, IN THE EXECUTION OF PERFORMANCE OF THIS CONTRACT.

ENGINEER'S TOTAL LIABILITY TO CITY FOR ANY LOSS OR DAMAGES FROM CLAIMS ARISING OUT OF, OR IN CONNECTION WITH, THIS CONTRACT FROM ANY CAUSE INCLUDING ENGINEER'S STRICT LIABILITY, BREACH OF CONTRACT, OR PROFESSIONAL NEGLIGENCE, ERRORS AND OMISSIONS SHALL-NOT EXCEED ONE MILLION DOLLARS (\$1,000,000.00). NEITHER PARTY TO THIS AGREEMENT SHALL BE LIABLE TO THE OTHER PARTY OR ANY THIRD PARTY CLAIMING THROUGH THE OTHER RESPECTIVE PARTY, FOR ANY SPECIAL, INCIDENTAL, INDIRECT, PUNITIVE, LIQUIDATED, DELAY OR CONSEQUENTIAL DAMAGES OF ANY KIND INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO LOST PROFITS OR USE OF PROPERTY, FACILITIES OR RESOURCES, THAT MAY RESULT FROM THIS AGREEMENT, OR OUT OF ANY GOODS OR SERVICES FURNISHED HEREUNDER.

All notices and communications under this Contract shall be mailed or delivered to **CITY** and **Engineer** at the above addresses.

9. Successors and Assigns

CITY and Engineer each binds itself and its successors, executors, administrators and assigns to the other parties of this Contract and to the successors, executors, administrators and assigns of such other parties, in respect to all covenants of this Contract. Except as noted in the first part of this Paragraph, neither CITY nor Engineer shall assign, sublet or transfer its interest in this Contract without the written consent of the other. Nothing herein shall be construed as creating any personal liability on the part of any officer, council member, employee or agent of any public body which is a party hereto.

10. Termination for Convenience of the Parties

CITY may, from time to time, request changes in the Scope of Work of **Engineer** to be performed hereunder. Such changes, including any increase or decrease in the amount of **Engineer's** compensation, or time for performance, which are mutually agreed upon by and between **CITY** and **Engineer**, shall be incorporated in written amendments to this Contract. Any subsequent contract amendments shall be executed by the City Manager or other authorized representative as designated by the City Manager or City Council.

As required by State Statutes, the City must designate a City Depository. Local Government Code Section 105.017 allows the depository services contract to extend up to five years. The City has had a long-standing depository relationship with American National Bank spanning more than 29 years.

The City requested proposals for depository services and received only one response; American National Bank. The RFP document required the bank to have at least one branch in the corporate limits of Rockwall and each of the 14 banks fitting that criteria s was sent a request for proposal package.

ANB meets all requirements of the state statute and offers a wide range of beneficial services to the City. All of the current online banking and branch services are continued in the proposal. ANB is required to ensure that all funds are fully collateralized at all times. City accounts are monitored daily by the bank to ensure full collateralization. The designation of ANB as the City depository does not preclude city management from using the services of other entities or advisors for financial services.

The depository arrangement with ANB is being prepared by ANB staff and the proposal terms were favorable to the city; staff therefore requests Council consider authorizing the City Manager to execute a contract agreement with ANB for the five-year period.

SUBJECT: Damascus Road Pro-Rata Facility Agreement Extension

Our Lady of the Lake Catholic Church widened Damascus Road back in 2010 to improve access to the Church and Heritage Christian Academy. The City Subdivision Ordinance required that adjacent properties along an unimproved road construct the road to City Standards at the time of development. These improvements would have been the responsibility of the Heritage Christian Academy and the undeveloped property owner along Damascus Road. The City approved a Pro-Rata Facility Agreement with the church on October 4, 2010 to address the future reimbursement.

This Agreement is entered into on the <u>18th</u> day of <u>October</u>, 2010, by and between the City of Rockwall, Texas ("City") and Our Lady of the Lake Catholic Church ("Church").

Whereas, Damascus Road currently provides sole access to Our Lady of the Lake Church, Heritage Christian Academy and an undeveloped 8.85 acre tract;

Whereas, Our Lady of the Lake Church is building a portion of Damascus Road;

Whereas, the City of Rockwall is to put forth a good faith effort to collect and pay to the Church the funds collected;

WITNESSETH:

That in consideration of the Damascus Road construction adjacent to the property owned by the Heritage Christian Academy (HCA), located in Rockwall, Texas, the parties agree as follows:

Section 1. Church agrees to the following:

- Church agrees to construct the approximately 1000 foot portion of Damascus Road that is not currently constructed (18' wide with 6" curb); including the 40-foot radius cul-de-sac, as shown on the plans prepared by Helmberger and Associates dated July 29, 2009 (Area "D" // on the attached Exhibit A).
- 2. The cost of the above referenced Damascus Improvements, including design, construction and City inspection (2% of construction cost) totals \$173,024.45.

Section 2. The City agrees to the following:

 City will collect, from the developer, or owners, of the property adjacent to the section of Damascus Road constructed by the Church ("B" on the attached Exhibit A), the "proportional" share of the cost of the

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above improvements (as determined by the appropriate sections of the City of Rockwall Subdivision Regulations), up to \$118,146.80. These funds will be collected when the undeveloped land adjacent to the improved Damascus Road is platted and prior to start of improvements on the property (and after the Damascus Road improvements are completed and accepted by the City).

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- The City will collect from HCA ("A" on the attached Exhibit A) the cost of 4-feet of the 18-feet of pavement, constructed by the Church (Section 1.1, above), and not paid by the adjacent property owner per Section 2.1, above, up to \$25,281.89. These funds will be collected when HCA expands its existing facility.
- 3. The City will pay the monies <u>collected for the improvements</u> as outlined in Sections 2.1 and 2.2 above, to the Church, within 15 business days of the receipt of the funds.
- 4. The City will not charge Heritage Christian Academy or Our Lady of the Lake Catholic Church, any pro-rata for the construction costs for the relocation of the Damascus and SH-205 intersection (which provides access to the Church and HCA), paid by the City.
- 5. Nothing in this agreement shall obligate the City to pay any monies other than those collected pursuit to this agreement in satisfaction of obligations herein stated. Failure of the City, for whatever reason, to collect associated fees shall not obligate the City to pay any monies to Our Lady of the Lake Catholic Church from any other City funding source.

Section 3. The City agrees that along with the widening of Damascus Road (to a minimum of 24-feet face of curb to face of curb, at this time), one additional point of access or emergency access, constructed in accordance with City Standards, will meet the City's requirement for the Church to obtain secondary access for current and future site development (as it relates to church expansion) for Lot 1, Block A, Our Lady of the Lake Catholic Church Addition ("C" on the attached Exhibit A).

Section 4. Nothing contained herein shall be considered as a waiver of the provisions of the City's Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance and Subdivision Regulations as the case may be.

Section 5. This Agreement shall remain in effect for a period of 5 years from the date of execution by both parties. 1. City will collect, from each developer, or owners, of the property adjacent to the Road Segment ("B" on the attached Exhibit A), the "proportional" share of the cost of the Road Segment (as determined by the appropriate sections of the City of Rockwall Subdivision

Regulations), up to \$118,146.80. These funds will be collected when the undeveloped land adjacent to the Road Segment is platted and prior to start of improvements on the adjacent property.

- The City will collect from HCA ("A" on the attached Exhibit A) the cost of 4-feet of the 18-feet of pavement, constructed by the Church (Section 1.1, above), and not paid by the adjacent property owner per Section 2.1, above, up to \$25,281.89. These funds will be collected when HCA expands its existing facility.
- 3. The City will pay the monies <u>collected</u> as outlined in Sections 2.1 and 2.2 above, to the Church, within 15 business days of the receipt of the funds.
- 4. The City will not charge Heritage Christian Academy or the Church, any pro-rata for the construction costs for the relocation of the Damascus and SH-205 intersection (which provides access to the Church and HCA), paid by the City.
- 5. Nothing in this agreement shall obligate the City to pay any monies other than those collected pursuant to this agreement in satisfaction of obligations herein stated. After diligent effort to collect payments, failure of the City, for whatever reason, to collect funds pursuant to sections 2.1 and 2.2 shall not obligate the City to pay any monies to the Church from any other City funding source.

Section 3. The City agrees that along with the widening of Damascus Road (to a minimum of 24-feet face of curb to face of curb, at this time), one additional point of access or emergency access, constructed in accordance with City Standards, will meet the City's requirement for the Church to obtain secondary access for current and future site development (as it relates to church expansion) for Lot 1, Block A, Our Lady of the Lake Catholic Church Addition ("C" on the attached Exhibit A).

SUMMARY:

Discuss and consider a request by Sam Ellis of Dallas Design Build on behalf of the owner Amalraj Fernando of MREA Properties-2, LLC for the approval of variances associated with articulation, screening and landscape buffers as stipulated by Articles V & VIII of the Unified Development Code (UDC) in conjunction with an approved site plan for a daycare facility on a two (2) acre parcel of land identified as Lot 1 of the Dewoody Addition, City of Rockwall, Rockwall County, Texas, zoned Agricultural (AG) District, situated within the North SH-205 Corridor Overlay (N SH-205 OV) District, addressed as 3011 N. Goliad Street [SH-205], and take any action necessary.

PURPOSE:

The applicant is requesting approval of certain variances as outlined below in conjunction with an approved site plan for the purpose of new construction of an approximately 7,828 sq. ft. daycare facility on a two (2) acre parcel of land. The applicant intends to combine the proposed two (2) acre property and the existing Children's Lighthouse that is adjacent (south) for the purpose of expanding the business operations. The property is zoned *Agricultural (AG) District* and has been granted a Specific Use Permit [*SUP Ord. No. 15-22*] on August 3, 2015 to allow for a daycare development. The property is also within the *North SH-205 Corridor Overlay* (N SH-205 OV) *District* and is generally located on the west side of North Goliad Street, north of the intersection of Pecan Valley Drive and North Goliad Street.

VARIANCE REQUESTS:

The applicant is requesting variances to the *Unified Development Code* (UDC) for certain sections as outlined below. As a note, a variance request to the UDC requires passage of a simple majority vote of Council for approval; however, a variance to the *North SH-205 Corridor Overlay (N SH-205 OV) District* requires passage by a ³/₄ majority vote of those council members present. The requests are as follows:

- a) Article V, Section 4.1 General Commercial District Standards to allow for not meeting the Horizontal Articulation requirements as established in Art. V, Sec. 4.1, C.1.a. and as depicted in the Building Elevations as submitted. (Simple majority vote)
- b) Article VIII, Landscape Standards to allow for not meeting the screening standards as established in Art. VIII, Sec. 5.6 Screening from Residential Uses which requires a minimum 6-ft high masonry screening fence. The applicant is requesting a 6-ft wrought iron fence that will be constructed atop the retaining wall at the rear of the property, but will not provide the required screening; however, the property is considered to be heavily treed and is screened by the existing trees. (Simple majority vote)
- c) Article V, Sec. 6.11 North SH-205 Corridor Overlay District to allow for not meeting the minimum 20-ft landscape buffer strip as established in Art. V, Sec. 6.11, E., 1 by

allowing nine (9) parking spaces to encroach the landscape buffer strip. (3/4 majority vote)

ARCHITECTURAL REVIEW BOARD RECOMMENDATION:

On August 25, 2015, the Architectural Review Board (ARB) reviewed the proposed building elevations for the site. The board expressed concern with the lack of horizontal articulation at the rear of the building, the gabled roof of the north and south elevations being highly visible and having no additional elements or interest, and the amount of stucco proposed compared to the existing buildings' use of primarily stone. The board suggested the building have more of a "campus" feel.

To address these concerns the board recommended that the applicant use hip roof elements and dormers on the north and south elevations to match the existing structure or to provide an overhang creating a "porch" effect as an additional architectural feature. The board also requested the use of more stone to match the existing building and wanted to see columns incorporated supporting the overhang at the rear of the property.

The applicant has revised the elevations and has incorporated stone columns along the rear, the addition of standing seam metal roof elements supported by cedar columns on the north and south elevations that project 8-ft from the building and create a covered area, increased the stone for the north and south elevation replacing the stucco, and incorporate a second stone product used as a wainscot around the building. The stone and stucco applied to the new building will match the existing Children's Lighthouse per the revised plans.

On September 15, 2015, the ARB reviewed the changes and requested the applicant change the north elevations' projecting element and provide articulation similar to the quality presented on the front (east facing) elevation. The ARB also included a recommendation of approval of the variance to the horizontal articulation standards.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

The site plan submitted by the applicant meets all the technical criteria stipulated by the *UDC* and *N SH-205 OV*, with the exception of the variances requested and the items listed below. Should the Planning and Zoning Commission choose to approve the applicant's request, then the following conditions of approval should be adopted with this case:

- 1) All staff comments (*Project Plan Review History*) provided by the Planning, Engineering and Fire Department must be addressed prior to the submittal of a building permit and to include the following additional Planning comments;
 - a. Adherence to Engineering and Fire Department standards shall be required.
 - b. All exterior signage requires submittal and approval of a separate permit through the Building Inspections Department
 - c. Submittal, approval, and filing of a final plat incorporating the existing Children's Lighthouse located adjacent to the property identified in this request prior to the issuance of a Certificate of Occupancy.
 - d. All exterior light sources are not to exceed 0.2-FC along the property line. The readings along the front property line (SH-205) as per the submitted plan exceed 0.2-FC at the property line. Make necessary adjustments and provide an updated plan indicating compliance.

- e. Approval of the variances requested from the City Council for not meeting the standards established in the *Unified Development Code* as noted in this report as follows:
 - a) the horizontal articulation standards,
 - b) the requirements for screening from residential uses,
 - c) by allowing parking spaces to encroach into the landscape buffer.
- 2) Any construction or building necessary to complete this Site Plan request must conform to the requirements set forth by the UDC, the 2009 International Building Code, the Rockwall Municipal Code of Ordinances, city adopted engineering and fire codes and with all other applicable regulatory requirements administered and/or enforced by the state and federal government.

PLANNING AND ZONING COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION:

On September 15, 2015, the Planning and Zoning Commission approved the site plan with staff conditions by a vote of 4 to 0 with Commissioners Renfro and Logan absent and one vacancy. The Planning Commission also recommended approval of the following variances by a vote of 4 to 0:

a) A variance to the horizontal articulation standards as outlined in staff's report, including ARB's recommendation; and,

b) A variance to the 6-ft masonry screening wall requirements as outlined in staff's report; and,

c) A variance to allow for parking spaces in the landscape buffer as outlined in staff's report.

SUBJECT: Landscape Ordinance Review Committee

As part of the *New Volunteer Opportunity Program* initiated by the City Manager's office, the Planning Department was tasked with leading a group of citizens through a comprehensive review of the City's landscape ordinances. The purpose of this exercise was to use local experts and interested citizens to make recommendations to ensure that the ordinances were conservation minded with regard to water usage requirements and policies. Committee members included Tim Nichols, Jan Self, John Thomas and Marcus Yarborough and City Staff members Andy Hesser and Ryan Miller. Through this process, the *Landscape Ordinance Review Committee* identified the following recommendations that could improve water usage with regard to landscaping throughout the City:

- 1) Smart irrigation meters should be required for all new commercial developments.
- The planting requirements for the City's Overlay Districts should be reduced from three (3) canopy trees and four (4) accent trees per 100-linear feet to two (2) canopy trees and four (4) accent trees per 100-linear feet.
- 3) The City's list of acceptable trees, trees to be planted within the landscape buffers of the City's Overlay Districts, and as replacement trees for tree preservation should be changed as stated in the attached packet.
- 4) An appendix should be added to the Unified Development Code that includes recommended planting lists for trees, shrubs, grasses etc.
- 5) Xeriscaping standards should be established as an alternative to conventional landscaping standards for the purpose of incorporating low water use plants and/or pervious hardscapes. Additionally, xeriscaping should be incentivized by allowing a 2.5% reduction in the overall required landscaping percentage for the purpose of making it a more attractive option to developers.
- 6) The screening required of a commercial development when adjacent to a residential development should be changed to include an option to allow a wrought iron fence with landscape screening where applicable.

In addition, City staff would recommend adding the following additional recommendation to address the installation of commercial landscaping during drought conditions:

7) During drought or water emergency response stages the Director of Planning and Zoning or his designee can grant an applicant permission to delay the installation of required landscaping to a specified time and date.

In response to the *Landscape Ordinance Review Committee's* recommendations, staff has prepared code amendments showing the proposed changes for the City Council's review. If the City Council chooses to accept the *Landscape Ordinance Review Committee's* recommendations staff will prepare a zoning case in conformance to the procedures stipulated by Section 4, *Unified Development Code Text Amendments*, of Article XI, *Zoning Related Applications*, of the Unified Development Code.

<u>Recommendation 1:</u> Smart irrigation meters should be required for all new commercial developments.

Municipal Code of Ordinances Chapter 10. Buildings and Buildings Regulations Article XVI. Irrigation Code

Division 1. Generally

Section 10-673: Definitions.

Smart irrigation controller means a signal based device that is capable of automatically adjusting irrigation patterns in response to weather data by monitoring moisture, temperature, humidity and other various environmental conditions.

Division 2. Design, Use and Compliance Standards

Section 10-699: Minimum Standards-Irrigation Plan Design.

- (c) All irrigation plans used for construction must be drawn to scale. The plan must include, at a minimum, the following information:
 - (1) The irrigator's seal, signature, and date of signing;
 - (2) All major physical features and the boundaries of the areas to be watered;
 - (3) A north arrow;
 - (4) A legend;
 - (5) The zone flow measurement for each zone;
 - (6) The location and type of each:
 - a. Smart Irrigation/Irrigation Controller; and
 - b. Sensor, including, but not limited to, rain, moisture, wind, flow, or freeze;
 - (7) The location, type, and size of each:
 - a. Water source, such as, but not limited to, a water meter and point of connection;
 - b. Backflow prevention device;
 - c. Water emission device, including, but not limited to, spray heads, rotary sprinkler heads, quick-couplers, bubblers, drip, or micro-sprays;
 - d. Valve, including, but not limited to, zone valves, master valves, and isolation valves;
 - e. Pressure regulation component; and
 - f. Main line and lateral piping;
 - (8) The scale used; and
 - (9) The design pressure.

Section 10-700: Minimum Standards-Design and Installation.

(A) All new commercial irrigation systems must include a smart irrigation controller that is capable of monitoring weather patterns and adjusting the frequency and/or duration of watering in response to changing weather conditions. <u>Recommendation 2</u>: The planting requirements for the City's Overlay Districts should be reduced from three (3) canopy trees and four (4) accent trees per 100-linear feet to two (2) canopy trees and four (4) accent trees per 100-linear feet.

Unified Development Code Article VIII. Landscape Standards

Section 3. Definitions

<u>Xeriscaping</u> means type of landscaping design that uses a combination of native plants and grasses, approved hardscapes and drought tolerant ground covers and planting materials for the purpose of conserving water and protecting the local environment.

Section 5.3 Acceptable Landscape Materials

- A. Plant materials used to satisfy the requirements of this article must comply with the following minimum size requirements at the time of installation:
 - ☑ Large trees must have a minimum caliper of three inches, or a minimum height of six feet, depending on the standard measuring technique for the species.
 - Shrubs shall be a minimum of three (3) gallons in size.
- E. As an alternative, the xeriscaping standards in Section 5.10 of this Article have been adopted to encourage new and existing developments to implement landscaping standards targeted at reducing water usage by using drought tolerant plantings and plans.

Section 5.10 Deleted. Xeriscaping Standards.

- A. Purpose. The purpose of this section is to promote the establishment of water conscious landscaping through the implementation of xeriscaping principles. Additionally, this section is intended to provide an alternative to the typical landscape requirements for commercial properties.
- B. *Principles*. All xeriscaping plans submitted to the city should demonstrate conformance with the following principles:
 - 1. Planning and Design. Landscape designs and plans should take into account the regional and microclimatic conditions of the site, its existing vegetation and topographical conditions, the intended use, and the zoning (*i.e. vegetation zone*) of plant materials according to their unique water needs. Plans should take into account the various heights of landscaping materials. If the landscape plan is proposed in phases, to account for optimum planting times, all future phases should be included on the submitted landscape plan. In reviewing plans to ensure proper site planning and design, staff shall ensure that the plan: 1) preserves and protects existing vegetation, 2) preserves and protects topsoil, 3) stabilizes and covers all bare soil areas, and 4) incorporates energy/water conservation.
 - 2. Soil Improvement. Since soil tends to vary from site to site all soil should be analyzed to determine what plants are suitable to include on the landscape plan and if any soil amendments are required. Soil may require additional organic material be added to ensure the continued health of plants.
 - 3. Appropriate Plant Selection. Plant selection should be based on the plant's adaptability to the existing site conditions and need for supplemental watering. Most xeriscape plants

will not require supplemental watering. In selecting plant materials, mature plants and shrubs should be used to ensure establishment after installation. A list of plants that are native and acceptable within the City of Rockwall has been provided in Appendix F, *Recommended Plantings*, of the Unified Development Code; however, staff may approve alternate plantings if they are deemed appropriate for the site. In reviewing plans for conformance to this principle staff will consider the: 1) diversity of the plant species being proposed, 2) size, maturity and water requirements of the selected plantings, and 3) variation of height, spread and color.

- 4. Practical Turf Areas. The type and location of turf areas are considered to be a major design element in xeriscape plans. Turf in this case involves typical varieties of Bermuda, St. Augustine, Ryegrass blends, etc. The maintenance needs of turf can be minimized by the shape, area, irrigation equipment, and turf type selected. Drainage areas and sloped areas are especially suited to the use of native grasses as opposed to turf. In reviewing plans to ensure that the turf areas being proposed are practical staff will review: 1) the design of the turf areas [with rounded, compact turf areas being more efficient], 2) turf areas should be designed to be on a separate zone from other landscaping, 3) turf should be appropriate for the selected location, 4) turf should be avoided on slopes and drainage areas in favor of native grasses, and 5) minimize turf areas by using native grasses, hardscape elements and alternatives.
- 5. Efficient Irrigation. All landscaping is required to have an irrigation system that is designed by a licensed irrigator. Additionally, all irrigation systems should be designed to be water efficient utilizing low-flow irrigation equipment. The plan should show that turf areas should be watered separately, and plants should be grouped in separate zones based on water need. Finally, all irrigation systems are required to be maintained in proper working order.
- 6. Use of Mulches. Mulches minimize evaporation, reduce weed growth, slow erosion and help maintain soil temperature. In reviewing the use of mulches in xeriscape plans staff shall ensure: 1) the use of a deep layer of mulch in planting beds [*typically 3-4 inches*] is utilized, and 2) mulches should be locally or regionally derived materials. Additionally, mulches may include the use of pea gravel, crushed granite, rock or pebbles in unplanted areas.
- 7. Appropriate Maintenance. Proper pruning, weeding and fertilization as required with all landscape plans shall be required. Typically, xeriscape plans require less maintenance, fertilizer and other chemicals and pesticides.

C. Standards.

- If approved with a Landscape Plan native grasses shall be exempt from the rules and requirements of Section 16-43, Weeds, Brush and Grass; however, the grass should be maintained to a height typical for the particular native grass.
- 2. Drainage or detention areas that utilize native grasses in lieu of turf shall be exempt from the requirements stipulated by Section 5.12.C (*i.e. one [1] tree per every 750 square feet of dry land area*). Instead, a shrub or ornamental grass per every 1,500 square feet of dry land area shall be required to be planted on the site or around the detention area.
- 3. A maximum of 30% mulches or hardscape is permitted to be incorporated into all xeriscape plans. This may be increased by the Planning & Zoning Commission if deemed appropriate and necessary for the proposed plan.
- D. Approval of Xeriscape Plans. All xeriscape plans shall require approval by the Planning & Zoning Commission, upon a recommendation by staff concerning conformance to the requirements of this section, at the time of site plan approval.

(Ord. No. 06-14, 4-17-2006)

Section 6.4 Credit for Xeriscaping.

The overall landscaping requirement may be reduced by 2.5 percent when the Planning Director or his/her designee determines that the standards stipulated by Section 5.10, *Xeriscaping Standards*, of this Article have been satisfied. <u>Recommendation 6:</u> The screening required of a commercial development when adjacent to a residential development should be changed to include an option to allow a wrought iron fence and landscape screening where applicable.

Unified Development Code Article VIII. Landscape Standards Section 5. Mandatory Provisions

Section 5.6. Screening from Residential Uses

- A. Any commercial or industrial use or parking lot that has a side or rear contiguous to any residential district, or any multi-family use with more than five dwelling units or parking lot that has a side or rear contiguous to any single-family, townhouse, or duplex district, shall be screened with a masonry fence (excluding tilt wall or concrete block are prohibited; however, precast walls may be approved by the Planning and Zoning Commission unless approved by the city council, six (6) feet in height, unless otherwise approved by the city council. As an alternative, berms in conjunction with a minimum of a six (6) foot wrought fence and a combination of trees and shrubs can be utilized to meet this the screening requirements if the Planning & Zoning Commission determines that the proposed alternative will provide sufficient screening. The screen shall be located no closer to the street than the property line. Any ordinances concerning sight obstructions of intersections shall be applicable to the screen where it is intersected by a street or driveway.
- B. Prior to construction of any required screens, complete plans showing type of material, depth of beam, and structural support shall be analyzed by the building permit office to determine whether or not:
 - 1. The screen will withstand the pressures of time and nature;
 - 2. The screen adequately accomplishes the purpose for which it was intended;
 - 3. Plans shall be sealed by a registered engineer or they shall conform to the city's standard design for screening walls.
- C. Such screen shall be constructed prior to the issuance of a certificate of occupancy for any building or portion thereof.
- D. The areas adjacent to the required screening wall, or areas adjacent to a public street or right-of-way, shall be maintained by the property owner in a clean and orderly condition, free of debris and trash in accordance with the applicable codes of the city.

<u>Recommendation 7:</u> During drought or water emergency response stages the Director of Planning and Zoning or his designee can grant an applicant permission to delay the installation of required landscaping to a specified time and date.

Unified Development Code Article VIII. Landscape Standards Section 7. Completion of Landscaping

Section 7.1. In Accordance with Approved Plans.

Except as otherwise provided in Subsection 7.2, all landscaping must be completed in accordance with the approved landscape plan before a Certificate of Occupancy may be issued for any building on the lot; however, during drought or water emergency response stages the Director of Planning and Zoning or his designee can grant an applicant permission to delay the installation of required landscaping (independent of Subsection 7.2) upon receipt of a letter from the applicant stating that the landscaping will be installed by a specific date that is within a reasonable time period not to exceed six (6) months. The Director of Planning and Zoning may extend the agreement for successive terms if the City is still under drought or water emergency response stages.

F.1. INTRODUCTION.

These guidelines were drafted by the citizens and local experts for the purpose of outlining the requirements of Article VIII, Landscape Standards, of the Unified Development Code, and to provide guidelines for plantings that are appropriate within the City of Rockwall.

F.2. PURPOSE.

The purpose of the following appendix is to provide a general reference guide for meeting the requirements of Article VIII, Landscape Standards, of the Unified Development Code. This appendix is not intended to be a comprehensive list of all plant materials that can be utilized for development within the City of Rockwall. The Director of Planning or his designee can approve a landscape plan that includes tree, shrub, and grass varieties not indicated in this appendix upon a finding that the proposed planting is appropriate for the development.

The Rockwall Economic Development Corporation Board approved the attached budget at their Board meeting on September 17, 2015.

The budget is largely unchanged from this fiscal year's base budget. The EDC having completed the infrastructure and Justin Road projects this summer did not include any major projects in the budget. About \$1million of bond proceeds from 2013 remain which can be used for similar projects. A number of previously contracted incentives are due to be paid in fiscal year 2016. The EDC's unallocated operating reserves will remain \$2.4 million dollars after those payments and operating expenses.

REDC President, Sheri Franza, will be available at the Council meeting to present aspects of the budget and answer any questions.

The City received a supplemental funding request for hotel occupancy tax revenues from The Colbert Project. Copies of the Funding Request Questionnaire and supporting narrative is attached for your review. Their request totals \$40,000 for promotion of their fourth annual Firefighters Ball, which was held at the Hilton on August 29. The subcommittee recommends \$6,700 award for promotional expenses.

In addition, Musicfest requested more funds for the 2015 Labor Day concert. The original application was for \$18,000 and the Council awarded \$8,000. The City Recreation staff has been asked to assist with coordination of the event – in a similar manner as they did for the Memorial Day concert. A supplemental request for an additional \$4,860 has been submitted and is recommended for funding.

Also, in 2014 the City hosted "Rib, Rub and Run" received hotel tax funding. This event was in transition from the Mainstreet program to the Recreation department at the time and a request for 2015 hotel tax funding was inadvertently not prepared. The event brings many people to the downtown area and to area hotels. Funding is requested in the amount of \$10,000 and is recommended by the subcommittee. In addition, the City is hosting the TAAF conference at the Hilton next week. Having originally allocated \$6,000, the committee is recommending an additional \$3,000 for conference expenses.

Included in the Chamber of Commerce report for fiscal year 2015, which is attached in the Council packet, is a request to reallocate \$37,590 of previously allocated funding for the Chamber's boat show, which had to be cancelled for 2014 due to low lake levels. The Chamber has been paid the funds, has retained them, and is now asking to be allowed to use the funds for the purpose to support, produce, publish and distribute three Rockwall-centric magazines. The subcommittee is not recommending funding and instead is requesting the funds be netted against the payment to be allocated for fiscal year 2016.

SUBJECT: Hotel/Motel Funding Recommendation

The Hotel / Motel subcommittee comprised of Council members White, Lewis and Milder met to discuss funding requests for budget year 2015-2016. The Council received a notebook including the organization's requests along with their required reporting for this year's funded events. Attached is a summary of the requests with the previous year's allocations to the organizations. This summary also includes the subcommittee recommendations as to funding for the coming budget year.

Revenues and Fund Balance

Staff continues to be conservative in the projection of revenues. With that said, revenues increased by 6.5% during the current year and are expected to maintain that level for fiscal year 2016. We expect to receive \$350,000 in hotel tax revenues and to finish fiscal year 2015 with a fund balance of \$110,000. The committee chose to maintain a healthy fund balance in order to allow flexibility in meeting supplemental requests during the year.

Funding Levels

Funding requests for fiscal year 2015 totaled \$483,170 which is a 10% increase from the current year's requests. Each specific application was discussed and whether they met our stated purposes and the state statute's requirement for "heads in beds". The subcommittee's recommendations for funding are attached. The subcommittee chose to fund events as funding allowed with most organizations receiving less than they requested due to a lack of sufficient revenues. One program request from the Chamber of Commerce for monument signage was specifically not recommended for funding and is are noted on the accompanying spreadsheet.

Contract Language/Documentation

Each organization will continue to be required to provide documentation such as a log, guestbook, registration list or other documentation that specifically notes if each person is spending the night in a hotel establishment. The City provides a link which must be included in each printed ad or event website with contact information for the hotels.

Staff will be available at the Council meeting to answer any questions.

General Fund

The General Fund as adopted will anticipate tax collections based on a 48.53 cent tax rate with expenditures adjusted as discussed at the previous Council meetings.

The budget as included in the Council packet includes funding for Meals on Wheels Senior Services in the amount of \$30,000. Council member White has requested a separate vote on this funding from which he will recuse himself. STAR Transit is included in the amount of \$55,201.50 as discussed at the September 8th Council meeting. Councilmember White requested a separate vote on that funding as well.

If further discussion of any specific appropriation is needed it should take place prior to the vote on the budget ordinance.

Water - Sewer Fund

The budget as proposed reflected increased sales revenue from a rate increase. The associated rate resolution will be presented to Council shortly with the new rates to be effective on January 1st.

Budget Cover Wording

Senate Bill 656 effective for budgets adopted after September 1, 2013 requires specific wording is included in the adopted budget document. The following statement will appear on the cover of the document and be published on the City's website for one year:

"This budget will raise the same amount of revenue from property taxes as last year's budget. The property tax revenue to be raised from new property added to the tax roll this year is \$511,174."

Staff proposes Council have the statement read into the record prior to the Council's vote on the ordinance adopting the budget.

CITY OF ROCKWALL, TEXAS

ORDINANCE NO.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCKWALL, TEXAS, LEVYING THE AD VALOREM TAXES FOR THE YEAR 2015 AT A RATE OF \$.4853 PER ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$100.00) ASSESSED VALUATION ON ALL TAXABLE PROPERTY WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY AS OF JANUARY 1, 2015 TO PROVIDE REVENUES FOR THE PAYMENT OF CURRENT EXPENSES AND TO PROVIDE AN INTEREST AND SINKING FUND ON ALL OUTSTANDING DEBTS OF THE CITY; PROVIDING FOR DUE AND DELINQUENT DATES, TOGETHER WITH PENALTIES AND INTEREST; APPROVING THE 2015 TAX ROLL; PROVIDING FOR EXEMPTIONS OF PERSONS OVER SIXTY-FIVE (65) YEARS; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCKWALL, TEXAS:

Section 1. That there be and is hereby levied for the year 2015 on all taxable property, real, personal and mixed, situated within the limits of the City of Rockwall, Texas, and not exempt by the Constitution of the state and valid State Laws, a tax of \$.4853 on each **ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS** (\$100.00) assessed value of taxable property and shall be apportioned and distributed as follows:

- a. For the purpose of defraying the current expenses of municipal government of the City, a tax of \$..2342 each ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$100.00) assessed value of all taxable property.
- b. For the purpose of creating a sinking fund to pay the interest and principal on all outstanding bonds of the City not otherwise provided for, a tax of \$.2511 each ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$100.00) assessed value of all taxable property, within the city which shall be applied to the payment of such interest and maturities of all outstanding bonds.

Section 2. That all ad valorem taxes shall become due and payable on October 1, 2015, and all ad valorem taxes for the year shall become delinquent after January 31, 2016. If any person fails to pay the ad valorem taxes on or before the 31st of January, 2016, the following penalties shall be payable thereon, to wit:

During the month of February, six percent (6%); during the month of March, seven percent (7%); during the month of April, eight percent (8%); during the month of May, nine percent (9%); during the month of June, ten percent (10%); and on or after the first day of July, twelve percent (12%).

Section 3. Taxes are payable in Rockwall, Texas, at the office of the designated Tax Collector. The City shall have available all rights and remedies provided by law for the enforcement of the collection of taxes levied under this ordinance.

Section 4. All delinquent taxes shall bear the maximum rate of interest per annum as provided by law, in addition to the penalties provided herein.

Section 5. All taxes for the year 2015 which remain delinquent on July 1, 2016 shall incur an additional penalty of twenty percent (20%) of the amount of taxes, penalty and interest due to defray cost of collection.

Section 6. That pursuant to Article VIII-1b of the Constitution of Texas, \$60,000 of the appraised value of residence homesteads of any married or unmarried persons, including those living alone, who were sixty-five (65) years of age or older on January 1, 2005, shall be exempt from ad valorem taxes.

Section 7. This ordinance is enacted in order to authorize the collection of ad valorem taxes for the year 2015 and shall take effect immediately from and after its passage.

SUBJECT: Ambulance Ordinance - Exclusivity Repeal

This item has been placed on the agenda for action Monday evening. As of the time of packet distribution, the draft ordinance is not available. My being out of town has contributed to the delay in preparation, and Frank is researching several legal questions that the Mayor has requested.

Frank will want to discuss direction from the Council, so this item will be read for consideration first in Executive Session. Based on the direction that I think I heard from the Council at the last meeting, I have asked that Frank not prepare a Franchise Ordinance, but that the Ordinance be prepared to:

- 1. Repeal the exclusivity aspect of the current ordinance
- 2. Require that ambulance companies desiring to do business in the City, as a single requirement, register with the City and provide proof that they are licensed by the State of Texas to operate their business in Texas.

I understand that there may still be discussion on the matter Monday evening. Frank will provide legal consultation first in Executive Session.

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
